

Bundy's Bistro presents...

"Cauliflower & Blue Vein Soup"

Cauliflower is one vegetable that is not often used to make a delicious and mouth-watering meal. It's normally used as part of the Sunday roast (cauliflower au gratin), in a vegetarian frittata, and occasionally in Asian stir-fries. In the coming winter months, we tend to make the traditional soups such as Minestrone, Pumpkin, Chicken or Tomato.

I hope this recipe will be enjoyed along with the all-time classics.

Ingredients

150 Grams Butter
1 large Leek (Sliced)
2 medium Cauliflowers (cubed)
2-1/2 litres Chicken Stock
250 grams Blue Vein Cheese (crumbled)
Pepper (and salt if required)
3 cups Croutons
Chives

Method

- In a large pot melt the butter and cook leeks for 5 minutes on a medium heat, then add cauliflower and cook for another 5 minutes.
- Add chicken stock and pepper, bring to the boil and simmer for half an hour.
- Once the vegetables are soft, turn off heat and allow mixture to cool, then blend (use food processor or Bamix) until mixture is smooth.
- Return pot to the heat and bring to the boil, add the Blue Vein cheese and stir until the cheese is well mixed in.
- $\bigcirc \qquad \qquad Option if you like to have a richer soup: add \frac{1}{2} cup cream.$
- Just before serving, add the croutons and sprinkle with chives.

Theory: Wednesday pm 21/5

The theory session was aimed at introducing the trainees to the basics of four wheel driving. Subjects including environment, stall recovery, sand, mud, snow, and rock driving were covered, along with many other items. The session went well, with plenty of questions and discussion time, and by the end of the night everyone was looking forward to the weekend.

Practical: Saturday 24/5

We met at Ferntree Gully at 8.30am and made our way to Gembrook where we caught up with several other members as arranged. From there we set sail for Kurth Kiln. Once we arrived, cuppas were made before the practical side of the training commenced. Firstly, John went through recovery equipment emphasising the importance of carrying at least one snatch strap and rated bow shackles. A look over the 100S to show recovery points and accessories available to make those trips a little more comfortable, we then checked each vehicle to establish that everyone had adequate recovery points. We left Kurth Kiln and searched for a hill to put all that stall recovery theory into place. As you can imagine, with the number of vehicles it took quite some time for everyone to practice and learn this important procedure. From there, it was time for lunch which we had at Ship Rock Falls.

After lunch we searched for a few tracks for all to learn a little more about the art of four wheel drving. We made our way along Hunters Rd, Ash Landing Rd, Log Dump Tk and Anderson Rd. At this stage,

James took over as trip leader and showed us a few tight, twisty and sloppy tracks. At Black Snake Creek Rd it was time for those who were not staying the night to head on home. John, Anthony, Graham, Sue, and myself stopped to collect firewood and then made our way back to Kurth Kiln to set up camp. Peter headed home to pick up a few supplies and his brother, Craig, and meet us back at camp. A good night was had, and thankfully it was dry and not too cold.

Sunday 25/5

As we had planned to drive a few more tracks, those who had sought the warmth of their own home overnight, returned on Sunday to join us. Paul and family, James and family, and Ray and Dawn joined us in the morning, with Ray and Dawn only spending breakfast with us before heading home with Peter and Craig. The daytrippers made our way to Helmet Rd onto Pines Tk, Lawless Tk and onto Burgess Rd. 					2WD roads	No winching required.
Extensive use of 4WD	Not much distance travelled today.					
Mud tyres recommended	Mud terrains with chains fitted.					
Full recovery gear recommended	Bring at least 2 snatch-blocks and all your D-shackles.					
Some mud	We measured 1.4K in length of mud on one road.					
Short cut	4K in 9 hours.					
Winching may be required	Once you get off this winch, try and make it to the next one.					
Easy navigation, will not get lost	They will not find this road junction.					
Could be slippery	Try and stay on the track.					
Back before lunch	Should be back by night fall.					
It can get wet in the Otways	They got 20 inches last week.
