Merringtons Update

Following is a summary of the email sent to the 4WDVic by John Partridge on Tuesday 5 October 2004:

On a recent club training trip (26 Sept) we dropped by Merringtons Camping Ground to check on its condition. We were very surprised to find the gaetst locked with a bi-lock. The next working day (Mon 27/9) I rang Noel Lees (DSE) to express my concern over this popular camping ground being closed and the lack of communication. Noel apologised and stated that the ground shouldn't have been closed and that he would try to find out how it was the gate was locked... He has since opened the gate and removed the lock. We also talked about an email I recently sent about some idiots performing donuts on the grass at O'Tooles camping ground which included the offenders rego number and business ame that was on the side of the vehicle.

Today (Tues 5/10) I ran into Neol Lees to see how he went. He still doesn't know how the gate came to be locked but it is now open. After opening Merringtons, he went to inspect O'Tooles. He is distressed with the damage there. It is so bad that he will need to get a grader in to repair the damage. As a result of this, the camping ground will be closed until the end of the season closures (just before Cup w/end). I passed on to him that we understand that these areas may need to be closed from time to time as conditions dictate and that it seems that we are banging our heads up against a brick wall. Noel is fed up with the constant damage that is being caused in recent times. I floated the idea that maybe clubs could obtain the keys to these gates during times they are closed. This has a few benefits:

- 1. Undesirable people are kept out during periods when the area is wet.
- 2. They can monitor who has been in. As this would only be clubs which follow the Tread Lightly! Principles there should be no damage to worry about.
- 3. It would encourage other people to join a 4wd club to gain access to these camping grounds, therefore more people are educated about responsible 4wdriving and camping.
- 4. The grounds will be in great condition when reopened.

Noel was very keen on the idea and will talk to the head ranger, Peter West, on Thursday.


Stress Management...

TRIP REPORTS

POWERWORKS, MORWELL – 22-23 MAY 2004

Trip Leaders: David & Rosalie Hughes

Saturday 22nd May 2004

After a series of unexpected visitors, Neil and I left home at 4pm. The shadows were lengthening considerably and some trees appeared to have a golden glow in their autumn colours as we travelled towards Morwell.

We met up with Rosalie, Dave and almost all the gang at the Morwell Hotel/Motel at 5.40 pm. After quickly unpacking and catching up with long lost friends, we headed off to Powerworks at 6pm. By this time the moon was a blurry slither in the inky sky.

The Powerworks building was like a welcoming beacon in the black wintry night. After signing in (for security reasons), we enjoyed hot finger food and non-alcoholic drinks while we wandered around the large and informative displays.

Clark was our barman and guide, a thoroughly knowledgeable bloke who had the knack of herding us around in the kindest possible way. Moving into the theatrette, Clark was obliged to take a digital group photo. He said it was for security reasons; but I think he couldn't believe that so many good-looking people could belong to one club.

He explained, using large three-dimensional maps, how Victoria has enough brown coal in the ground for hundreds of years. Although the coal is under a large area extending from Bacchus Marsh to Cann River, it is closest to the earth's surface in the Morwell area, and therefore most accessible. Over millions of years the forests of Kauri Pine and scrub, the natural vegetation of this area, became the poor quality brown coal of today. It is deemed poor quality because it is two-thirds water.

After watching a 10-minute video it was time to climb into the bus waiting near the back door of Powerworks. However, Clark had warned us that as we would be away for a couple of hours, a toilet break was advisable before we left. I think he may have regretted warning us, as there was quite a long queue with so few loos available, and so many customers.

After leaving handbags and cameras behind (once again for security reasons), we boarded that gutsy little Mitsubishi bus, wearing our warm coats, hats and scarves. Clark was our driver, with his assistant Michelle. Clark explained that he preferred not to use the kerosene heating on board, if he could avoid it, due to the fumes. Yes! Kerosene heating!! We thought he was joking!

The Mitsi took off into the still, cold, black night. Once we began our journey, the windows quickly fogged up. It didn't seem so cold any more in the cosy atmosphere, as everyone snuggled next to each other on the narrow double seats. Rebecca and Craig had the bench seat at the rear all to themselves.

We were bouncing along the road, rocking and rolling, wondering if the workmen's helmets lying in the racks above us were going to rain down over our heads. The diff made a noisy grinding sound to add interest to the journey. Reaching Loy Yang, we saw the first bunker illuminated in the darkness. It holds enough coal to produce eighteen hours of power supply for Victoria.

Once we passed through security, we followed the road used by the workmen along the open cut. Looking into the blackness we saw what looked like a couple of small floating cities. The many bright lights were such a contrast to their surroundings. A long way below ground level, the dredges were working. They had rows of brilliant lights, like many short runways at an aerodrome.

Clark, our driver, illuminated some fossilised trees in the embankment using the Mitsi headlights while parked at an interesting angle on the gravel roadway. At this stage the cold was really getting to us, and the windows were badly fogged; so the kero heater was ignited with some difficulty. The odour was really something, but we appreciated the warmth.

We returned along the bumpy gravel track, which then became a made road, taking us past the huge cooling towers. The bus pulled up under an enormous cream coloured building. It was so brightly lit, with huge, and odd shaped steel forms crowding underneath. It was noticeably glary after the blackness we had become accustomed to. The atmosphere was quite surreal – as though we had arrived at a scene from a science fiction movie.

At this point, we disembarked from the bus. The atmosphere was very noisy and we felt dwarfed by our surroundings. Following strict instructions, we donned the regulation helmets, adjusting them as required, placed the safety glasses in position to protect our eyes, and inserted the mouldable ear-plugs which had been provided.

Clark, plus Michelle and twenty-three of us crowded into the lift, which was lined with silver chequer-plate. Rosalie almost disappeared behind Dave at the back of the lift. We could only hear her magic laughter and catch glimpses of her at times.

After travelling nineteen floors up, we were divided into two groups to look out at the single chimney located in the "paddock" nearby. We were at a level that was only one-third of its height. (The chimney is actually taller than the Rialto.) It was unsettling to be walking along the large expanse of steel mesh decking, and looking down through another eighteen floors of the same see-through decking.

Jumping back into the lift, we descended to level two. Talking was impossible as we walked around three enormous turbines. Each turbine was about double the length of a locomotive. Had a sticky nose through a window to the battery room. There were incredibly huge banks of batteries with thick black cables coming out. Perfect for duel battery systems!

It was so strange to think that although this was such an industrious workplace, we had not set eyes on one person who worked there. Apparently only twenty people are required at any time to operate our power system.

On our return to the bus the windows were wonderfully clear, giving good visibility; if there is such a thing on such a pitch-black night!

Arriving back at Powerworks at 9.45, we were offered alcoholic drinks this time as well as non-alcoholic. Brown

Bros, Wolf Blas etc were the order of the day. The brightly lit dining room was decked out for our arrival, with two lengthy sets of trestle tables covered in white cloths.

We enjoyed the hot, tasty homemade oxtail or potato soup followed by a beautiful smorgasbord of roast meats, numerous vegetables, and various salads.
