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
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

PRESIDENT'S REPORT March 2005

Welcome everybody to the March edition *of Free Wheeling*.

This month at the general meeting we have Noel Lees from the Parkers Corner DSE coming in to have a chat to us. He will be discussing various issues that the DSE have to face and will have a few points that we could take aboard to make life easier for them. We will also be able to ask Noel questions regarding the tracks etc. This is a great opportunity for club members to understand what the DSE is about and also for the DSE to learn more about what we do and issues that we face. Noel is also a keen historian of the Aberfeldy-Jericho region and has vast knowledge of the mining history that can still be found in the bush. Noel will be travelling down from Rawson to attend this meeting, so try to make an effort to come on in and listen to what he has to say.

Once again 4WD's are under pressure from some groups. This time it has come around because a Sydney council has decided to double the parking permit fees. This is to "discourage rate payers from owning large cars". Of course, Harold Scruby from the pedestrian council has spoken up...

Mr Scruby said many people chose 4WDs because of the favourable five per cent tariffs, as opposed to 10 per cent for ordinary cars.

The 4WDs also needed a lot of room to park, were responsible for about 75 per cent of child driveway deaths and more likely to roll than any other vehicle, he said.

The fact is that in a report published a couple of years ago found that 8 out of 36 fatalities over a three-year period were attributed to 4WD's. Nowhere near the 75% reported by Mr Scruby. By my calculations it would be nearer 22%. Once again, take it easy out there. The size of our vehicles make them stand out from the other vehicles, so take extra care not to draw unwanted attention.

Hello all. Here we are for another month... Easter... mmm... mmmm... Hattah... roll on Easter!!!

Try this one...

Watermelon Granita



450g watermelon – skin and seeds removed. 1 tbsp liquid glucose or caster sugar ½ tsp lemon juice

Puree the watermelon in a blender or food processor, or chop finely and push through a metal sieve.

Heat the glucose, lemon juice and 75ml water in a small saucepan for 4 mins, or until dissolved.

Add watermelon and stir well.

Pour into a freezer tray (without the dividers!), cover and freeze... stirring every 30 mins or so with a form during freezing process to break up the ice crystals and give a better texture.

Keep in freezer til ready to serve, then roughly fork to break up the ice crystals.

I have contacted a local quide who will take us caving for 2hrs at \$30pp or \$35pp if overalls are supplied. For those who are not as adventurous, the Buchan Caves Reserve conduct guided tours through two lit caves with hand rails. This is also an excellent picnic ground so we will probably take the opportunity to have lunch there. Note that we are now planning to camp at Buchan Caves Reserve. Unpowered sites \$16.50 (1-3 persons); extra persons over 10 yrs \$3.50 p/n. I will need definite numbers by 14th of Feb and a \$10 deposit by the same date to secure our booking. This is only if you are planning on the adventurous tour as bookings are not required for the other tours. We will also do a day trip and explore the area further.


Tuesday 4th January

We left home at 10.30am to start our epic adventure to the SE SA Coast line. Our first stop was Narracoorte and we arrived there at approx 6.00pm. We had a few stops along the way for the obligatory rest periods as we see soooo many signs on the road to rest.

We set up camp at the Naracoorte Caves Camp ground. This is a very barren place with open areas and trees lining one perimeter with a row of trees in the middle as well, although the facilities there were very clean and modern. There were no real camp sites marked out, it was plonk where you like and fill in a self registering envelope (this seems to be the norm in all the places we went).

Wednesday 5th January

In the morning we went to have a look at the cave as this is what we came for. They were very pretty caves but not as nice as Buchan in my opinion (club trip in March to Buchan). They were more into the digging for fossils there and it seemed that the cave formations were a bonus second attraction.

We broke camp at 12.30pm and headed for Robe. We had a look at the camp sites in the Conservation Park camp grounds which turned out to be barren, shadeless

areas. This is not what we wanted, so we headed for the tourist information, just in case we missed that magnificent spot that is all the rage. Nope, nothing was missed. Disappointed, we headed down to Beachport to see if there was anything better. We found a beautiful tea tree sheltered area in the Conservation Park that suited us nicely. We set up camp for the next few days.

Thursday 6th January

We drove into Beachport to have a look around. It is a very pretty town with a population of only 400. Although, I might add that it is lacking a green grocer. Nice beach and very long jetty for fishing.

We took a drive on the dunes but stayed off the beach as our lesson from being stuck from driving alone was still fresh in our minds (refer report from Dargo on Tuesday 28th Dec). After we went through a few dunes we saw that there was traffic on the beach so we thought that we would try it as there were plenty of people around to get us out if needed.

The beach was beautiful; what a different look, vehicles and people sharing the beach together. There were only a few people around which keeps surprising me as everyone told us it was going to be very busy at this time of year.

No open fires made it very difficult to boil large amounts of water for the kid's baths and washing the dishes. My Christmas present from Santa (shower) came in very handy for bath times.

Friday 7th January

Not much happened today. We started nice and easy and went back to the beach that we drove on yesterday for a bit of a play. We did a bit of exploring or the surrounding tracks to see where they took us as there were some significant Aboriginal sites of interest to see. We tried following the orange markers as you are supposed to do, but they seem to disappear every now and again and if you miss one and take the wrong turn you end up in very soft sand where people have been playing. We lost track of the markers at one point and ended up on a beach with soft sand that just kept going and going. Finally we decided to bite the bullet and turn around as it didn't really look like this was going to take us anywhere of interest and of course the fact that we were on our own (there was some traffic).

Saturday 8th January

We broke camp at 8.50am (broke the club half past rule) to meet Carissa, Joe and the kids in Millicent. Refreshed our supplies at the supermarket and got all the information for the best camp site from the tourist information centre. We made our way to the spot that the man recommended in Canunda Conservation Park, but in true style for the area they were bare and dusty. Setting up camp in the shade does not seem to be important to anyone, as we see tents set up in full sun with no protection. They must get really really hot! We continued our search around the Conservation Park heading up to Southend and finally found a more suitable spot at Kotgee that was OK.

Sunday 9th January

We had a look around Canunda Conservation Park and made our way to the beach as this was our first truly beautiful day of the holiday. A little paddle, a little fishing at the beach – this is the life.

We drove past some camp sites just over the sand dune from the beach and saw that the caravan park ran it (Southend Caravan Park). When we checked it out they were great; they had shade, grass, and were big with open fire pits – woo hoo! We registered straight away and moved after lunch. Our problem was that we were looking for bush camping in the bush, we should have looked everywhere as this was in town and was called 'bush camping'. To be one-eyed you miss out on the good things.

Southend is a small town with a population of 298, fishing being its main source of income. With this in mind we bought fresh cooked crayfish for dinner from the local seafood shop. What a beautiful day; sun, surf, seafood and a great camp site. The perfect end to a perfect day!

Monday 10th January

Another beautiful day. We took a drive down to Carpenters Rocks as we were told that we were guaranteed of a fish between the lighthouse and the ship wreck. It took a while to get there as the tracks in the dunes are not marked. We finally put a line in the water and caught 3 fish. The man did say we were guaranteed a fish, not an abundance of fish. We caught 2 Salmon and 1 Mullet. It was a fantastic beach, perfect for the kids as the shallows went on for a while and they could jump waves with no worries of falling in deep water.

Tuesday 11th January

After breakfast we headed off to Robe for a proper look around and some lunch. A day of total fire ban meant we had to buy food to eat, or eat sandwiches tonight. Reluctantly we found a fresh seafood shop in Robe and bought more crayfish and oysters for our evening feast... what a burden. We found Beachport a nicer town than Robe. On the way back to camp we decided to take the beach/dunes track back. A few minutes into the return trip and the Nissan overheated after going up a large hill. We had to stop and let it cool for a while. While we were stopped, another couple of cars came over the hill (6 guys) and they ALL got out to have a look at the Nissan with the bonnet up (like bees to honey) and of course no-one could do anything so they all turned around and got back into their cars and went on. We decided to turn back and make our way down the highway rather than risk any permanent damage to the Nissan on the sand.

On our return to our camp site we found it a disaster site. The wind had been very strong as the forecast had predicted. We left our windows open in our tent and returned to find a thin layer of sand on everything inside. It must have blown over the dune from the beach as the camp site was grassy. We cleaned, repaired and continued to enjoy the evening feasting on our crayfish.

Wednesday 12th January

After lunch and the viewing of the lake, we continued our journey towards Glenelg River (Vic) our next camping stop.
