
We then headed Up Williamson Spur Track and down Flats Track to O'Tooles Camping Ground where we stopped for lunch.

Also at O'Tooles, Michael got into my vehicle so I could practise the theory that I heard about a few days earlier, 'stall/start recovery'. We practised it until I became comfortable with it on a not so steep track. Had about 5 goes, not bad for a first timer.

We all then returned into convoy and headed back up Flats Track, down & up Peasant Track where I had to use my new stall recovery technique, un-intentionally. I was heading up a woopsy-do when my vehicle began loosing revs and felt I wasn't going to make it over. With the guidance from John over the CB I managed to reverse the vehicle down the steep narrow track that had a steep fall down the side and one very nervous passenger in the vehicle. Reversed back as far as the next woopsy-do, placed it in my trusty 1st gear (rather than 2nd) and drove up without a glitch. The tracks got harder as the day went on, becoming steeper & rocky however I felt comfortable as I knew I had competent people around me for guidance.

I continued to practice the stall recovery technique throughout the afternoon. Tim & Craig were also given the opportunity to practice also.

We then headed back onto the bitumen, over the Thomson dam wall and across to Coopers Creek. Up a short cut track to Bruntons Track where we experienced a rutted track and practiced our wheel placement. This made me realise the importance of wheel placement as driving is only part of what's required. We then crossed the Thomson River at Bruntons Bridge, over the other side we had a bus load of spectators who took photos of us going across. Everyone stopped for at least 30 seconds to admire the view when exiting the other side of the river to drain the water from their vehicles, rather than the usual 10 seconds. We then crossed back through the river, back down the short cut track and back across at Coopers Creek.



By this time I thought I had already experienced the steepest tracks for the day, until we headed up Beardmores Track, this track is very steep, rocky & slightly rutted. We all made it through without any problem. We stopped for some firewood, Tim showed us his chainsaw skills and we headed down Merrington's Track to camp. Tarra-Bulga National Park is situated in South Gippsland approximately 200 kms east of Melbourne. It is well known for its giant Mountain Ash trees, beautiful fern gullies and ancient myrtle beeches. The park covers 2015 ha of some of the best examples of original cool temperate rainforests of the Strzelecki Ranges. The fern gullies are the home of the Superb Lyrebird, Yellow Robins, Crimson Rosellas, Swamp wallabies, wombats, possums, platypus, bandicoots and native rats. There are also seven species of bats, and numerous reptiles. There are three picnic areas situated within the park – at the Visitor Centre, Tarra Valley and Bulga. Camping is not permitted, but there are several caravan parks and other accommodation scattered throughout the Strzelecki Ranges.



Heritage

Until less than 100 years ago, most of South Gippsland was one vast forest, mainly consisting of Mountain Ash and other eucalypts.

From the 1870s, settlers cleared the land for dairy farming purposes in the western Strzelecki Ranges, leaving only a few scattered areas of forest. The rugged and steeper slopes of the eastern Strzelecki Ranges were opened for selection in the 1890s and settlers' cottages soon dotted the ridges. Due to the harsh conditions and the rugged nature of the land, many farms were abandoned or became neglected. The quality of the fern gullies led Alberton Shire Council, in 1904, to reserve small areas of forest near Balook, and in the Tarra Valley in 1909. The former was named Bulga, an Aboriginal word meaning mountain, while the latter was named after Charlie Tarra, an Aboriginal who guided Strzelecki and his party through Gippsland in 1840. Following recommendations by the Land Conservation Council, the two separate national parks were joined through a land exchange with APM Forests Pty Ltd. The enlarged and renamed Tarra-Bulga National Park of 1,522 ha was declared in June 1986.


