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

The Cooks Corner



Scones

2 cups self-raising flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon sugar
1 tablespoon butter
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup water
1 egg

Get your fire ready so that you have some hot coals. Sift flour and salt into a bowl and add the sugar. Mix. Rub in the butter until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs.

Add most of the liquid and mix to a soft dough with a knife. Add more liquid if needed. Amount of liquid will vary, depending on the moisture of the flour.

Put on a lightly floured board, mould into a round shape and pat out to about 2cm thickness.

Don't handle the dough too much as it will make the scones heavy.

Cut with a scone cutter (or cut into squares with a knife), brush tops lightly with a little extra milk and place in a lightly greased ovenproof dish.

Place your pre-heated hot camp oven onto a small mount of coals in a slight depression. Put a trivet inside the camp oven and place the dish of scones on top of the trivet. Put on lid - add coals to lid to help brown the tops of the scones. Bake for approx 10 to 15 mins.

Cooking time will depend on the heat of your coals. Serve warm with jam and cream.



After a sensible 8.30AM start to the day, it wasn't long until I was past the city and on my way to South Australia. With 120 MP3 songs on the CD the time was flying. It was quite impressive to see the long deep channel cut through deep, narrow limestone rocks leading towards the sea. On the plains there was fertile land due to the created channels. Forgot the name of the site.

We had a quick stop on the beach and got terribly excited, vast, white, empty sandy beaches, ready for our tyres to dig in.

Back at camp, the wind had done alterations to John's cooking quarters. No drama, he just changed it around. We had our dinner and sat together for a meal, drink and a yarn.



There are some extremely scenic sights of the Limestone coast and some great challenging dunes. Whilst it is only a 27Km trip it can take a few hours to complete. At the top of one of the dunes I was chatting to a guy that turned out to be the club member from the Wattle Rangers 4WD Club that had prepared the excellent trip notes that are available free from the Beachport visitor centre. Apparently he has updated these notes and soon they will be available from the S.A. association and FWDVic.

After completing this run we then joined onto Little Dip Conservation Park which winds its way through the dunes and the beach runs right into Robe where we stopped for an ice cream.

Tuesday 2 January

After spending a full day in the sand yesterday we thought we'd follow it up with another drive back through Canunda National Park as Gary missed out the other day. This time we didn't come across as many bogged trucks but I did manage to get Gary stuck. But some determination and some shovel work guaranteed that he didn't need assistance. Once again we had a great time and once again we topped it off with a cold ale in the Carpenters Rocks pub.

We decided to get some fush'n'chops at the Southend takeaway. Not exactly 'fast food', it took 50 mins!!

Wednesday 3 January

Today we headed inland to the World Heritage listed Naracoorte Caves. The park preserves 600 ha of remnant vegetation, with 26 caves contained within the 305 ha World Heritage Area. Whilst these aren't the most prettiest of caves I have visited, they are probably the most interesting. These caves, as with most of the caves along the Limestone Coast, were formed as the sea began to retreat to its present position millions of years ago. High ground water stands dissolved the limestone to form the caves at Naracoorte.

The Naracoorte Caves have acted as pitfall traps and predator dens for over 500,000 years, preserving a rich fossil record of Naracoorte's ancient fauna. This fossil record covers several ice ages and the arrival of humans to the continent.

Paleontologists have excavated and dated many of these fossils. They have reconstructed the skeletons of a number of Australia's extinct mega fauna, and have deduced their form and habits.

Thursday 4 January

Time has come to pack up camp and head out. First stop was to view the wind farms that are still in the progress of being built on the outskirts of Millicent. Once completed, there will be 120 windmills with the tallest standing some 120 meters high and they will deliver some 367 gigawatts of power to around 50,000 homes. You would have to burn some 450,000 tonnes of brown coal per year to produce the equivalent amount of electricity. From here we headed down to Port Mac Donnell for lunch,

From here we headed down to Port Mac Donnell for lunch, stopping on the way for a dip in the amazingly clear waters of Ewen Ponds.

We all said our goodbyes and headed our own ways. Thank you to Maggie, Leanne and Gary for an excellent trip. We might just have to do it all again next Christmas.
