

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
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FREE WHEELING



General Business:

Amendment to the Club Constitution - Definition of Membership

Proposed: Paul Ryan Seconded: Ashley Martin

Paul Ryan presented an amendment to the Constitution regarding the definition of membership in response to previous enquiries regarding Honorary Memberships from Club members. The Committee of Management have revised the categories of Membership of the Victorian Four Wheel Drive Club Inc. as defined in the Constitution and this was presented to the membership as follows:

There shall be three (3) classes of Member of the Association:

- Ordinary Member, comprising Single (Ordinary) Member and Family (Ordinary) Member. An Ordinary Member is defined as an active member of the club who, having paid their application fee and membership fee, is an affiliated member of the Association. Ordinary members have full voting rights and may occupy positions on the Committee of Management. Ordinary members are affiliated members of Four Wheel Drive Victoria and as such a portion of the membership fee is required to cover the costs of affiliation and insurance costs.
- Silver Member. A Silver Member is an active member of the club who has had 25 years continuous membership with the Association. In recognition of this the Committee of Management waives the membership fee for the Victorian Four Wheel Drive Club Inc. for these members. The member is not a financial member of the Association and therefore has no voting rights and may not occupy a position on the Committee of Management. The member continues to be an affiliated member of Four Wheel Drive Victoria and must pay the associated affiliation fee and insurance costs. A Silver Member may, if they so decide, continue to be recognized as Financial Member of the Association by paying their membership fee. Payment of the fee entitles them to full voting rights and allows them to nominate for and occupy positions on the Committee Management, if they so wish.
- Gold Member (formerly known as Honorary Member). A Gold Member is an inactive member of the Association who was formerly recognized as an Honorary Member. Gold Members are non financial members of the Association and do not have voting rights nor may they occupy a position on the Committee of Management. Gold Members are inactive and therefore are not affiliated members of Four Wheel Drive Victoria. Gold Members are not required to pay affiliation fees and insurance costs. Gold Membership may be bestowed on a member at the instigation of the Committee of Management.

The amendment was put to the vote of the membership present at the meeting and was carried unanimously.

The amendment will be included in the Constitution.

Congratulations were given to Peter & Lisa Petrou who were the first members present at the meeting to qualify for Silver membership under this amendment for having been with the club for 25 years.

Under the amendment Silver Membership will also be extended to the following members with our Congratulations and thanks for their continued support:

I am going ahead with the Lake Eyre trip and have set the following itinerary. I expect to leave Melbourne around about 8.00am on the Saturday, hopefully getting to Renmark sometime in the late afternoon. I am planning to camp near Katarapko Creek on the Murray on the first night and then Parachilna Gorge on the 2nd.

The idea is to take a relaxed few days getting to William Creek and then use William Creek as a base to do some sight seeing for a couple of days. The only other thing that I have set definite sights on is to be in Tibooburra in time to see the Grand Final on Saturday.

Other than that everyone is most welcome to come or go as they please. The route we are taking is most likely 2WD all the way and should be suitable for Campers and / or off road Caravans and there are plenty of places to get fuel (LPG may be a stretch but should be OK).

Over the last 18 years member clubs of the Four Wheel Drive Victoria have supported Oxfam Australia in their annual delivery of Christmas Trees. This has become a very successful fund raising activity selling and delivering fresh green Christmas trees to homes in metropolitan Melbourne.

This letter is to inform those clubs who have not previously been involved how the operation works and to remind those clubsth who have helped in recent years that the deliver dates this year are Saturday 4 and Sunday 5th December.

Volunteers carry out the whole operation. Last year nearly \$126,000 was raised, that's about \$500 per delivery vehicle, and went towards alleviating poverty and social injustice within Australia and overseas. That's a total of over \$98,000 raised by members of Victorian Four Wheel Drive Clubs.

We ask for drivers, navigators and vehicles that can carry 8 to 25 freshly cut trees, with or without a trailer. Many 4WD clubs have found this a fun activity that makes a considerable contribution to the larger community in which we live.

We meet at the Scout Hall, Pakenham St., Blackburn (Melway Map 47 H 12) on Saturday 4 December, or Princes Hill Primary School, Wilson St., Nth Carton (Melway 29 J 11) on Sunday 5 December. On Saturday we deliver to the south and eastern side of Melbourne and on the Sunday the north and western side. You pick the area you would like to deliver the trees, and the day and time (between 6am and 11am on Saturday and 7-10am on Sunday) you arrive at the depot. We give you a very well organized list of addresses with Melway grid references, all in close proximity to each other. All you do is drop off the tree that has already been paid for. The smiles you receive from the younger recipients would be second only to that of them greeting Santa Claus. It will take each team 1 to 3 hours, and we encourage you to meet for a BBQ or social get together before or afterwards. If your club can help I would appreciate a phone call with the approximate number of vehicles by late October and I would immediately forward you a form (or use the blank Excel Spread Sheet that should be attached with this doc-

ument) so the details of each driver can be filled in and returned to us by the end of November. Please email or phone me if you would prefer I post your club a hard copy form now to pass around at your next club meeting for volunteers to add their details.

Last year the following 4WD clubs generously donated their services: Idlers, Adventurers, CFA, Jackaroo, Nissan, LROCV, Melb. Jeep Owners, Pajero, Range Rover, CH4WD, Subaru, Toyota Landcruser, VFWD, Wanderers, Toyota, Getabout, Port Phillip and City West, a total of 19 clubs and about 175 vehicles (plus 50 vehicles from Oxfam's other supporters). Also Four Wheel Drive Victoria threw their weight behind the eent and in the past has managed to attract television news coverage of the great work being done by club volunteers. Each of the above groups seemed impressed with the nature of the cause and our organization and indicated a desire to be involved again.

Each year I do the rounds of the media to promote tree sales and always mention the great support given by 4WD clubs. Last year a 8 minute interview with John Faine on Radio 774 netted an extra 550 orders. Our feedback is that listeners are so keen to support a good cause when they know that everyone involved is a volunteer and no middle person profits. In the past I have been fortunate enough to have the opportunity on Macca's 'Australia All Over' to give all involved a mention and let the listeners know this tremendous fundraiser could not happen with generous support by volunteer 4WD club members.

Finally I'd like to thank once again all those clubs and members who have so generously supported this vital community fundraising activity over past years.

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NO STAKED TYRES! NO BUSTED SHOCKS! A REWARDING EXPERIENCE (DEFINITELY!!!)



Does history repeat? Well, yes when you reference our Madigan trip with that of Cecil Madigan's trip in 1939, according to his book "Crossing the Dead Heart". More of that later, let's start at the beginning.



The trip originally had a start of 5 vehicles three cancelling for different reasons. Two were at the eleventh hour - we received a phone call from Mark that he couldn't make it & Gary to say that his vehicle had blown a turbo at Alice Springs! O.K. - 2 vehicles left to tackle one of the hardest treks the Aussie desert can throw at you - the Madigan Line.

After receiving the near impossible to get permission to access Camps 3,4 & 5 (Pmere Nyente land) and private station access to Camps 20, 21 &22 we left Mt Dare after refuelling & a good night's rest on the 1st of July . The day started very overcast and the rain came shortly after (damn!) We drove the wet track to Old Andado where we were greeted by a couple of volunteers who were helping look after Molly Clark's property until her arrival that weekend - 90 years of age and still frequents her old house on the edge of the Simpson Desert occasionally.

After a cup of tea with the volunteer caretakers we were on our way - until a truck carrying 44s of diesel arrived. One of the volunteers asked if we could unload the drums from the truck - no worries was our reply. The truck is part of a mining fleet in the area where they exchange water from Old Andado's artesian bore for drums of diesel to power the generators. Leaving Old Andado we arrived at the Mac Clark Acacia Peuce Reserve, signed the visitor book and moved on (still raining).

Now the fun begins. Looking for Camp 1 took us a bit longer than anticipated, with new mining tracks in the area testing Jane's GPS skills. After doing a GOTO we eventually found it.

Camp 2 was easier as there was some resemblance of tracks that we could follow, and then on to The Twins, where we stopped and signed the book again - it goes back to the early 90s, so not much traffic out this way. Camps 3, 4, & 5 in the Pmere Nyente land were less well visited due to the difficulty in obtaining access due to no permits being granted except for scientific or government access. So for us to be granted a permit was very unusual but greatly appreciated.

The so-called track through Pmere Nyente land was very obscure in places, requiring constant GPS / paper map vigilance and the getting out of the vehicle and walking to try and find a way through this area the terrain changed from rocky outcrops to claypans, through to dry river beds. Vehicle speed at this point was about 10-20 kph (little did we know that this would be the norm for the entire trip).

A lot of pitching and yawing from left to right had us stopping regularly to stretch the limbs. The swales (areas between the sand dunes) were dry underfoot so there were no really soft / boggy areas here. Exiting Pmere Nyente land and heading for Camp 6 threw another obstacle in our way - a new set of tracks where we expected to cross the Colson track (there looks to be some sort of realignment of the Colson, so future travellers beware). Camp 6 is the start of the sand dunes where the going wasn't too bad due to the cold and wet weather making crossing the dunes O.K. due to compactness of the sand. To do his crossing in hotter weather would be testing traction a lot more, not to mention increased fuel usage as dunes were reaching 10-15 metres in this section.



On to Camp 7 with the going pretty much the same through to Camp 16.

At Camp 11 there's another visitor book to sign which goes back even further in time - definitely no

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traffic out this way!

The rain started again. By the time we got to Camp 14 it was time to wait out the rain - time for a rest day. It rained for 36 hours - not too bad when you consider that it can rain out here for days on end.



Moving on we reached Camp 16 on the Hay River track where - yes, you guessed it - there's another book to sign! John & peter had made a stainless steel plaque to commemorate our crossing. This now resides with other plaques near Madigan's Blaze Tree (1939).

We proceeded to Camp 20 after crossing some of the hardest, most isolated and wet areas of the Northern Simpson After walking the creek and looking for a winching base on the other side (in case I got stuck & John couldn't recover me from behind) I decided on a lir

With the Eyre Creek ford under water we were forced to travel the western side of the creek heading south following the sand dune base. We had to blaze our way over the moguls trying to get to the eastern side of the creek when possible. For a lot of the way Eyre Creek was as wide as the Murray - it was the most water up this way in 20 years!

After driving for hours and hours at 5-10 kph, we found a way across a narrow part of the reek. The base was very soft but it was our only option. I had tried crossing on earlier attempts but became bogged a couple of times (thanks John for the recovery).

base on the other side (in case I got stuck & John couldn't recover me from behind) I decided on a line - OK give it a go! First attempt - 2 metres in & down to the axles - very soft. Second attempt - different line - got to an island in the middle of the creek, waited for John & Peter to get across - success! Now for the other half of the creek - not so successful down to the chassis! After With lots of claypans that were underwater to negotiate, spinifex humps (moguls) to drive over and of course having to ask the feral camels if we were on the right track - because there was literally no track to follow, we eventually made it to Camp 20, which was totally under water! nearly 2 hours of winching (including a 30 metre extension strap) and a 45° angle, after the bank gave way, we finally made it to the other side. So much for the 4 o'clock track!

John's turns to negotiate the next half after taking a different line to mine. I placed my car in position as an anchor in case John got stuck. He proceeded to cross after stripping down to his undies, in case he had to get out midway. He gunned it with water & mud flying everywhere & made it through in one go! No diff locks either



nice one John!

To everyone's delight we made it onto station tracks on the eastern side of the creek - a freeway compared to the last few days of trackless driving. It was dark now so we set up camp & decided to look for Camp 21 in the morning.

Next day was Jack's 12th birthday. As everyone was awake at 0300 we decided to celebrate early! That is the earliest he's ever got his presents. Sorry John & Peter for the laughter at that time of morning.

After an early pack up we found Camp 21 & Annandale ruins.



As Lake Nappanerica was flooded (usually dry) we had a big detour (over an hour), around the lake, to get to Camp 25, the Birdsville Hotel.



We hit the Birdsville Caravan Park, ordered a birthday cake from the bakery and made our way to Camp 25 for an eagerly awaited meal. After our mains the birthday cake came out from the kitchen, candles alight & the whole pub (Lizard Lounge) sang Happy Birthday to Jack- fantastic!



It was pretty much straight going from here until we hit Big Red where we had the customary play.



The next day saw us bid farewell to John & Peter as this was the end of the trip. It was great to have their company on this adventure. They did a fantastic job of being TEC !!!

The trip from Mt Dare to Birdsville saw us travel 830kms over 10 days with heaps of detours due to the wet - without seeing another soul!! - This is what it's all about. After doing all the desert tracks from CSR, Anne Beadell, Gunbarrel, etc the Madigan will go down as one of the hardest due to the isolation and remoteness, including

the full dependence on a good GPS & paper maps.

By the way, a word of warning - never travel solo on this trip. An HF radio, sat phone & PLB, at a minimum, are mandatory. Be well prepared as nature in all its glory can throw you a curve ball and everything can change instantly.

Bring on the next adventure!!
