

Then the storm rolled in. Lightning, thunder, wind, horizontal hail, horizontal rain and even snow. We all ran to our respective sleeping arrangements to ride out the night. We all survived.

We were back on the go around 9am while snow was falling and the remainder of the track was easy compared to what we had done the night before, no winching required. That being said it would be rated as very hard or extreme by our club standards. We made it out just after 2pm that day.

The reason for this story is as a thank you to that group of friends who saved me. They were truly the nicest bunch and I can't thank them enough. They know who they are and if they read this, thank you and I really hope to run into you again on the tracks.

That's it.

I hope to see all our members at the next general meeting and out on the tracks.







Friday 5 May 2017

Heading up we met at the Erica Hotel, a wonderful meal enjoyed by everyone. We headed to Fiddlers Green for our first camp. A camp fire enjoyed by all. It was a bit chilly up at Fiddlers Green.

Saturday 6th May

Up early and packed up, we cleaned the area of rubbish, cleaned the signs and whiper snipped around the area. The water trough next task, another clean up, removing rubbish and unwanted vegetation.

Then to the Eldorado mine site, clean up, remove rubbish and unwanted vegetation. Then moving on to Aberfeldy town where we talked to Barbara Smith who lives there. She



enlightened us on the progress of the historical society, pointed out that there was a toilet block here and it was taken away. Thanking us all for the work we do, as she pointed out everyone does a little and we achieve great things.

Heading down Pluto track, a bit slippery, we removed a tree.

On to Aberfeldy crossing, where we worked on the walking track to the sign at the end, explaining why there is a bottle collection there. The two whiper snipers working, with others removing rubbish, and cleaning the path. The sun shined and we all worked hard.

Then we decided to go down O'Keefe track, the weather turned and we stopped at the communication tower, as you can see the dark clouds. A few drops of rain, as we headed to Little O'tooles for our camp.



As we were setting up camp this little kookaburra sat in the tree laughing at us. I asked did he know something we don't? Yes that it was going to rain all night.



Sunday 7th May

The weather overnight was a deluge, it precipitated all night long. So we assessed how to get out and we decided to take the safe option, across the river crossing at Jorgenson and there were loads of campers there, obviously the rain made this a popular place. The slipping on the wet road, we passed Merringtons flat and on to the main road.

It was a great weekend even if the weather was not as pleasant on the Sunday.

But all the boys enjoyed a play in the mud on the way home.

With the forecast earlier in the week predicting a large amount of rain, Ashley's trip to Avoca was postponed. However, as the rain didn't seem to eventuate, we decided to do a last minute trip to Marysville on a reconnaissance trip.

We met up at the Beechworth Bakery in Healesville at 9am for breakfast and to stock up on food for lunch before continuing up to Marysville.

It was decided to use Mount Margaret Road as our access into the Rubicon State Forest. The first track we came across was Ghost Point Track and stopped to air down before embarking down the unknown. The going was pretty easy but this track obviously didn't get much traffic and after successfully passing under one fallen tree, discovered our path blocked by a multitude of fallen trees further on. We turned back and continued along Mount Margaret Road again until finding Boundary Track.

Our map highlighted that Boundary Track was rough with bogholes but that didn't deter us from taking a look. While the track was a little loose and muddy, it looked to have been recently graded so we didn't have any particular concerns until a large falling branch narrowly missed Callum's Ranger followed by a suddenly disappearing track.







The track had become overgrown but we were able to continue for a short way before the track magically reappeared and we popped out on Keppel Hut Track. It was here, we saw what had been doing the track grading and let the kids see up close the heavy machinery.

Following this track, we found Keppel Hut and sat down at the picnic bench next to the hut to have our lunch. The hut has been rebuilt after some bush fires and it looks really nice. With our stomachs full, McFayden Track was next and proved to be a little more technical than anything we had done so far on the trip. It was a narrow track with sections of mud and rocks to negotiate and it led us to Tom Burns track which had us testing bogholes for depth before crossing.

It was 2.30pm by now and we arrived at the power station to the south of the Rubicon Historic Area. After a quick stop, we had to start making our way back to a major road to head home. Driving north along Roysten River Road, we noticed an interesting track called Snobs No 6 Track that had to be attempted. This turned out to be a really fun track where we were driving in sloppy mud ruts. Taking it slowly and running muddies, we found the vehicles still stepping out, giving the rally driving feel.



Last stop was Snobs Creek Falls as it was on the way out to the Snobs Creek township. It was quite spectacular and quite a lot of water was cascading down, making for great sounds as well. As it was now 4pm, we aired up and high tailed it out home.

The area was very picturesque and the driving fun. We briefly encountered some trail bike riders, mountain bike riders, runners and another 4wd group but otherwise seemingly had the tracks to ourselves. The tracks we drove are subject to seasonal closures so will look to run a trip once they reopen.



Our trip begins on Good Friday at 6am meeting up with Stuart & Maree and Mick & Sally at the 7 eleven service station in Ardeer North where we had McDonald's for breakfast. From here we headed for Mildura, on our way there we stopped at Wycheproof bakery for morning tee and had some

amazing coffee & cakes and I had a magnificent Nutella donut.

From here we continued on towards Mildura where we stopped at Red Cliffs to have a look at Big Lizzie a unique large crude oil powered prime mover.

From here Stuart & Maree left us to visit friends of theirs near Mildura so we headed for Renmark where we stopped for dinner and then made tracks for Burra where we stayed for the night in a wonderful miner's cottage and had a relaxing night. In the morning we packed our bags and had a look around town and found a great cafe where we had a cuppa & breakfast.

After we had our fill we filled up the vehicles and had a look around town and found a historic open cut mine on the outskirts of Burra with great views and loads of interesting mining equipment and buildings.











We then left Burra and headed for Hawker where we stopped for lunch some fuel and some fresh vegetables, when we had finished our shopping we then headed for Alpana Station where we set up camp. Stuart & Maree were about one hour behind us. It was great to be there; we had travelled about 1200km to our first camping ground.

After we set up camp we lit a fire with some of the wood I had in Tiny and we relaxed around the camp fire. We got up on Sunday morning and decided to go to Wilpena Pound where we spent the morning. We went for a walk to the homestead and then had lunch at the information centre. From Wilpena Pound we headed for Brachina Gorge.

Driving through Brachina Gorge is a wonderful experience full of beautiful colours and rock formations we stopped about half way take a picture when Maree spotted a yellow footed rock wallaby, we then headed back to camp.






The next day we drove the Mt Samuel self drive 4WD Experience on Alpana property. It took most of the day, with great views and some of the best technical tracks through Mt Buggery Gorge and on to Angorichina Village. We fuelled up and then went to Blinman and stopped at the hotel but it was closed. So we headed back to camp for the night. We had a fantastic day.

The next day we had booked a drive on Mt Caernarvon Track which used to be part of Skytrek but is now separate and run by volunteers. This was the most spectacular track of the trip climbing to a height of 921metres and situated on Bunkers Conservation Reserve and takes most of the day to drive this track.

The views from Mt Caernarvon are stunning and when we reached Davey's lookout there was a short walk to the lookout. When you reach it, there's a bus stop seat to relax and enjoy the views. After this we stopped and had lunch and then headed back to camp for our last night at Alpana Station.







We all packed up and headed for Baltana Station via Parachilna where we stopped at the pub for lunch and had an amazing meal. From here we headed for Baltana station and set up camp Baltana station is massive its 1,876 square km.







This is where the trip became interesting as we started to get rain which caused the closure or some of the tracks we had planned to do. So as usual we had a change of plan so we decided to go for a drive to Marree via Farina township and camp ground.

We stopped at Farina and had a look around the ruins reading the story boards and learning about the history of this little town. Lots of fun. We then went and had a look at the war memorial set behind the campgrounds—what a beautiful spot.



From Here we headed for Marree for a look around. Marree was one of the towns that the old Ghan train use to stop at, and is also the point where both the Oodnadatta track and Birdsville track meet. From here we headed back to camp where it's been raining so it looks like tracks will be closed for another day so we will have to think of something to do.





Over the night we had rain again which meant that the tracks would remain closed. So one of the station hands suggested that we take a drive to Aroona Dam and then down a back road following the old Ghan railway to the town of Baltana. Then back onto the main road and back to camp.





This was an interesting day Aroona dam was brilliant and then the town of Baltana was awesome with plenty of buildings in good condition. We visited the art gallery of a local painter that was great to see. We then decided to have lunch in the town. After lunch we headed for Baltana Station the back way and had a look at the Afghan memorial and then back to camp.





The following day we decided because the tracks were still closed we headed to port Augusta to do our washing and make a day of it as well. We got about 35km down the road when we find at Black swamp the road flooded and there were cars and truck parked on each side of the flood water waiting for the water level to drop.





I have never see such a sight where a flooded road becomes a social event. Everyone was patiently waiting for the floodwater to drop. In the mean time we all gathered and had a chat some people had been waiting for four hours. The flood water level was at about 600mm and flowing hard when we first arrived.

When the water level dropped to about 500mm, two road trains decided to cross the floodway. The funniest thing happened when the first truck exited the flood water his one of the spare wheels was floating away from the trailer. So Mick and someone retrieved the wheel - an unusual sight. After about three hrs the water level dropped to 450mm when we decided to head back. Stuart changed into shorts and walked the road to check depth and for water flow and road damage all was good. Stuart decided to give it a go and drive through the flood water so we decided to follow. This is where someone on the other side of the floodway took a picture of Stuart and emailed the picture to the club.





We then headed back to camp that night we decided it was time to leave Baltana and head to Arkaroola. So in the morning we packed up camp and headed for Arkaroola and set up camp. The following morning we drove the difficult track which was a great drive with some interesting tracks. We stopped at Bararranna Gorge and had some lunch. I got a great picture of a yellow footed rock wallaby and some great features.







After we completed the track we had to decide where to from here. We looked at what roads were open and where we wanted to visit. So we decided to head for Camerons Corner for one night and then to Tibooburra and onto Broken Hill for two nights.

We packed up the next morning and headed for Camerons Corner the drive there was all dirt road. About two hours in, we came across some real muddy section of roads to the point that Stuart made it through and I just made it. Mick almost made it so Stuart helped pull Mick out and they went around the boggy bit.

We continued on and came across some eagles on the side of the road and when we reached the road to Merty Merty. We stopped to put some fuel in and clean the windscreen. Boy, red mud was everywhere.





We continued towards Cameron's corner as the sun was setting and the colours of the sand dunes was amazing, We arrived at Cameron's Corner on sunset it was spectacular. We then set up camp and had a meal It was one of the highlights of our trip. The Publican with beer in hand joked and joined us for a short time and made us all feel welcome. Can't wait to get back there. After dinner and a couple of drinks we went back to camp and had another drink where the friendly horse took a liking to Mick.







From Cameron's Corner we headed for Tibooburra where we had lunch and filled our fuel tanks. Stuart and Maree decided to leave us as they wanted to go to Deniliquin. So Mick, Sally, Lisa and I headed for Broken Hill where we visited the main attractions such as Art Galleries, Railway Museum and Mining Museum it was a relaxing walk around town.



From Broken Hill we headed for Wycheproof where we stayed the night and then headed home for what was a fantastic adventure with friends. We travelled about 6,000km over 16 days I would like to thank Stuart & Maree, Mick & Sally for Joining us and for their help.
