



Following on from our club night where Hella came and showed off their light trailer they had a limited number of invites to go along to their showroom and spend an evening with them learning about their products and providing feedback to them on how we use driving lights.

The evening started with a challenge in finding the location, they have just recently moved to new premises with the same street name as their old one. The security guard was very helpful and most people made it before the start of the evening.



Hella's Managing Director for Australia welcomed us and gave a brief history of the company. He was very encouraged by his team engaging with the 4WD community. We then had a session on learning about lights, lighting, lumens, lux and how the bigger the lumen it is not always better. There are a lot of factors in lighting and finding the right one for you. I learnt that it is not good for fatigue to have a hard line between light and dark when driving and that it should slowly dissipate to help your eyes out. I also learnt that they tend to have more yellow light (less lumen) for mining sites as it is safer for the miners as it is not as fatiguing to them.

We had the chance to have a look at the competition vehicle that Hella sponsor for the outback competition racing over pizza as well as chatting to the team from Hella. Through the night they were asking us questions on how we drive, what lights we use, what marketing we see, what magazines we read and TV shows we watch. They

acknowledged that they have not focused on this market for awhile and it is an area that they want to do more in. We had the opportunity to ask questions and we all got to take a pressie home from Hella. I am sure you will see some of them out on the tracks soon.

Overall it was a fantastic evening where I think people learnt a lot. They have offered to come back soon to show us their lights as well as their other catalogue items that can help with camping.

This trip was planned and promoted by our Trips 'Master' Bruce, however he had to pull out the week prior, due to his leave being cancelled. So the show must go on.

We all headed off at varying times on the Friday and met up at the Southern Oceans Caravan Park in Beachport - our home for the next 4 nights. The trip down was uneventful except for the storm force headwinds we had all the way. The conversation around the red torch light that evening (our imaginary fire as it fires were not permitted that evening) was the amount of extra fuel we all went through. I used 77 litres from Ballarat to Hamilton alone.

The next morning we headed off at 9ish for the sand. We made our way south of town, aired down to 15psi and straight onto the beach and headed for Carpenters Rocks. It was high tide and was meant to be receding so we had to stay high on the soft stuff. Within 5 minutes I got stuck, stuck again, stuck again, stuck again, and again - in all 7 times we had to dig me out and set up the recovery tracks before I got passed the really soft stuff - I



was now down to 10psi. Whilst recovering and digging out the sand the wave action caught a few of us and I had some wet shorts. Now out I pushed on under heavy right foot and pulled up 100 metres along the beach.

Now it was Ben's turn. Fortunately with a little more of a run up, he only got stuck 3 times! It had been a long morning already with many hands and shovels assisting. Now the remaining 4 had our tracks to follow and with more speed all got through this soft patch without mishap. Of course afterwards there was the usual Nissan & Toyota banter!

We had no other traffic on the beach and with the tail wind we made good speed to Southend, wherein we had to exit and travel along some tracks to the rockpools on the point. We went looking for some shelter in the dunes and stopped for a well-deserved lunch in a camp ground. Whilst out of the wind and as soon as we shut down the beasts we had a sharp rain shower. We'd had it all that morning and had travelled only 6 km's in 3 hours.





After Lunch we pushed on and followed the track through the Canundra National Park. With a little black top driving to get past the rocky outcrops, it was back into the park and on towards the wind turbines. Today it was back on to the sand this time heading north to Robe.




Finally, on to Morrison Lookout out over Lake Eldon and surrounds.

Morrison Lookout








EDITOR'S NOTES

More to Explore App

The More to Explore App was recently launched by DELWP & Forest Fire Management it is ideal for Bushwalkers, Four Wheel Drivers, Fishers etc. to plan and enjoy the great outdoors in Victoria and covers all our State Forest areas.

The app provides an interactive map, descriptive information and photos of our visitor sites and recreational trails and enables you to download maps for use offline, when out of mobile phone range. The data is maintained directly by Forest Fire Management Victoria field staff and provides the latest and most up-to-date information available (includes the latest information on any visitor site or trail closures).



Can you help us?

The More To Explore app includes track data, campsite info, photos and track rating guide which has been previously provided by some of our club members. The track information in the app is limited at this stage so we are asking our members for help in collating more tracks into the App. Four Wheel Drive Victoria is working with DELWP in supporting this App as part of our key volunteer work projects.

So if you could assist by collecting some track data next time you are out on the tracks it would be greatly appreciated. We don't need any data from National Parks at this stage, just from State Forests. This app works really well and will become an asset for all four wheel drivers and recreational users of State Forests. Please make sure you log your hours and kms travelled so we can include them in our volunteer hours log.

So! The information we require is location or name of forest, track name and if possible track log files, track difficulty rating using our track rating guide on www.fwdvictoria.org.au, photos of the track showing the most challenging section to give the user an idea of the track conditions, any other information such as points of interest, scenic spots and picnic areas etc. Have a play in the App yourself and you can see what information is already there.
