

The following is an important message to all members from Neville our Trips Coordinator regarding the use of our Club Trip forms and associated safety information. Please take a minute to read and digest.

To All Club Members,

As a committee we have decided to cease using the 4WD trips platform. The platform is no longer supported by the provider making in no longer a viable option. We are currently in the process of redeveloping our website with the aim of adding trip functionality within the new site.

In the meantime, we will be reverting to the paper-based forms. New trips will be promoted at the club meetings, giving the attending members the opportunity to sign up first. The trip will then also be advertised via Facebook and club email to all members. And of course included in each month's magazine!

Recently some of the procedures with maintaining records have slipped a bit and we are aiming to tighten up on this. This is important as we want to ensure that in the event something happens on a VFWDC organised trip, we have all the required information to assist our members.

When signing up for a trip electronically (SMS/email), we ask that you include all the details that are on the Trip Form. We can then maintain the participant list to take with us on the trip.

We ask all trip participants to fill in the Personal Info Form and keep it in their Glove or centre console of their car in a sealed envelope. Please label the envelope – **Personal Info & Your Name.** Please complete a form for each participant in the car.

The Trip Leader will be required to "lay eyes" on the envelope. This can be done at the meet up point or when airing down when the trip leader would normally walk around all the cars to check for suitability/recovery points for the trip.

This form can provide extra information in an emergency and will assist Emergency Responders. If you have any questions, please bring them up at the next meeting or contact me.



What motivates/inspires you?


Just spending quiet time out in the bush, when everything can just slow down.

Trip Report

We started our morning with a quick briefing of our plans for the weekend and allocation of people into two groups. I was allocated to John's group with the plan to head out to Canunda National Park and through to Carpenter Rocks.

We took the highway to the start of Canunda National Park where we entered the park and had our first U-turn for the day before we stopped to air down the tyres and attach the sand flags.



We followed the mud map notes through the first section of dunes which was fairly easy driving due to the amount of rain that we were having.



We left the park boundary and we were following a dirt road to the next section when we came across a couple who were walking along the track. They had just left their vehicle to find help. The driver was inexperienced in driving on dirt roads and had come around a corner too quickly. She lost control overcorrected and sent their Mitsubishi Challenger into the trees and shrub on the side of the road. Fortunately they were uninjured. The windscreen was cracked and the roof rack had come off during the impact which had left the car stranded on a small embankment.

We grabbed a couple of shovels to remove the dirt around the tow bar so we could recover the car. The chainsaw also came in to use to clear the shrub and branches around the car to prevent further damage. John hooked up the snatch strap and gently pulled the car off the embankment. The car was able to be driven so we left them to head out hopefully at a more sedate pace.



We then continued on our journey and eventually we head back into the dunes after Coola Outstation.

We stopped at the Lake Bonney and Windfarm lookout and had a bit of fun exploring the dunes, of course staying within the carpark posts and then found a place to stop for lunch.





We followed the trip notes to Cape Banks Lighthouse where we stopped to enjoy the view before airing up and heading back to camp. It was a nice drive but uneventful as the driving conditions were easy and our group reasonably experienced which meant no recoveries were required.

Day 1

People made their own way to Beachport SA on the Friday and arriving throughout the day. I had a slower trip with the caravan, and it rained most of the way. There was a different array of accommodation from caravans to swags to rooftops to people having cabins as well.



Day 2

Ben had split the group into two groups as each group was going to be heading in different directions on each day due to the size of the convoy.

Our group, which was originally called group two (2), then the name was changed to the Pink Group and we ended up being called 'John's group' in honour of our illustrious leader Mr. John Partridge. Our group started by heading South towards South Rocks and did mainly in land tracks on the sand as well as a little bit of dune driving.

Not too long into the drive, we completed our first recovery. We came up to a car that had run off the road into the scrub and caught up on a land bank as well as trees. As these people were not part of our group, they didn't want to do the trip report – not sure why. The people were fine, but the car was a bit battered and bruised. Our group was quick to assist; we had people on the shovels, we had people on the chainsaw and had people at either end of our convoy just in case to warn any cars coming up the track. The recovery itself was straight forward, John put a strap at the back of the Patrol and on the tow hitch of the other car and a gentle pull off the dirt mound for the car. Their car was still drivable. They thanked us all for our help and headed off. I think Cal took some footage of the recovery.

We continued to head south via some inland tracks until we came upon some dunes and a look out to Lake Bonney. The dunes were a lot of fun – probably the highlight of the day.



We had a mix of weather from bright and sunny to windy and wet, particularly at lunch time. We continued to the Cape Banks lighthouse where we aired up and headed back to Beachport. Most of the group went to the Beachport Hotel for a drink and dinner, it was pretty busy and some waited quite a long time for their meals....

Day 3

Today was our turn to head up towards Robe. We all departed camp at approximately 9:00 AM. It wasn't too long until we were able to hit the beach. Not long after I got caught up exiting a beach which was rutted and required an uphill left-hand turn. I tried a couple of times to no avail and reluctantly had to make the call to say I needed some help. The group was great helping getting the straps etc organised for John to be able to recover the car not before the paparazzi took full advantage of the 1st club member recovery. It didn't take too long for the Everest to be recovered, but it did shake the confidence a little.



Once we were up and going again the track signs were a little hard to follow and ended up on the dunes but wasn't really clear on how to get out – we eventually made our way back to the marked track and continued north. The day was mostly out on beaches then back to some inland tracks etc. Some of the inland tracks were a little tight and I could hear some scraping as you drove through - I was feeling for Anthony who was out in his brand new Ford Ranger.



Lunch was in the car as it decided to rain right on lunch time. There were a lot of other 4wds on the tracks and some points were becoming pretty congested. We aired up at Robe and headed towards the ice-cream shop where Rory very generously picked up the tab – thanks Rory. Following the ice-cream the group headed in different directions, Ant, John and I headed to the Robe town Brewery for a tasting paddle, Rory headed out for a walk, some members returned to Beachport and others remained in Robe.

The weather further deteriorated that night with strong wind and rain which left some camp sites a little worse for wear.

This was a planned rest day, some people packed up and headed home on account of the weather whilst some had a day off 4wding and did some wineries around Penola.

John, Rory, Anthony and myself decided to go for a quick beach run from Beachport to South End – the weather was pretty average, there was some very soft sections of sand – everyone (including me) got through unscathed.
