

We all met up at the Gisborne Café after 8AM. Some of us had breakfast, coffee and grabbed supplies at the local IGA. Rolled out after 8:35AM. Got on Carrols Lane and everyone aired down at the firewood collection point/motorbike unloading area. We had a look at everyone's vehicles to check for recovery points and winch to see how the formation will go.



First track was Wombat East
No.8. We encountered the same
bog hole I got stuck last time —
this time I took the chicken track.
Neville unfortunately got stuck in
the same hole as I did. He got to
test out his winch for the first
time. After fumbling for the
isolator switch, Tristan managed
to hook the winch to the tree.










By 11AM we came out of the track hungry for lunch. I had checked online the week before and emailed DELWP who assured me their interactive map that Firth Park was open. Arrived and it was gated! Sally offered her 270 degrees awning to stand under for lunch



Next track was across the road, Firth Park Loop I think it was called. More bog holes and wasn't too hard. Next destination was Andersons Mill. Google maps showed me a 'shortcut' to it. Unfortunately, about 400m in there was a fallen tree in middle of the path. Everyone U-turn!

We made our way on the gravel road to Andersons Mill track where we overtook two keen mountain bikers. This track was very cruisey and a calm before the storm i.e next track. It was about 2PM that the group wanted to hit one more track before heading home. We headed to Diggers Track which was meant to be easy according to online reviews from 2015.

We reached a giant pool of water. Everyone took the left easy track except Sally who wanted to drive in it. Trip Report

Easter Darling River Run Tour by Sally

Tristan and Sally - Land Rover Discovery Michael - Ford Ranger

When I worked out that it was a year where Easter and Anzac Day were close together, I thought it would be a great opportunity to take 4 days off and get 10 days holiday. This meant we could explore further than just Victoria. I thought it would be a great opportunity to travel the length of the Darling River from Northern NSW to where it joins the Murray River in Wentworth.

Day 1 - We arranged to meet Michael in Craigieburn to then make our way to our first stop at Cocoparra National Park, 20mins north of Griffith. We stopped in Tocoumwal for a lunch break and checked out the giant cod. Cocoparra National Park is a tiny park that is packed with birds. The campsite was very spread out with great amenities. I will definitely go back to do some hiking and exploring in the area another time.





Day 2 - Cocopara National Park to Brewarriner via Lake Cargelligo and Nymagee.


An early start as we wanted to get to Brewarriner to start the Darling River Run the next day. We turned out of the park and took the most direct route north. It did not take long to our first airing down so we could negotiate the track. It is definitely not a 2 wheel drive track that is for sure. It was great to have a little bit of off road driving. Scary thing is google suggests this route into the park for everyone

We made it through with no major issues and just a little bit of fun. Next Stop was Lake Cargelligo for a top up of drinks and things we had forgotten from the general store. There was a great piece of silo art that was only just being finished (see front cover). We then stopped in Nymagee for lunch and then headed up to Beds on Barwon where we were staying for the night. Beds on Barwon is on the Barwon River and has great campsites looking right over the river. The amenities are great and easily accessible from the campsites.





We found a beautiful spot on the Barwon River. They had a communal fire pit so we hung out around the fire for the evening and we got to meet the local wildlife. A gecko decided that it wanted to hide under Tristan's foot for a little bit. Michael got to meet a frog when it jumped out of the sink at him in the dark.






Day 3 - Brewarriner to Trilby Station.

First stop of the day was the historic Barwon Bridge.





And then the next stop was the 40,000 year old aboriginal fish traps in Brewarriner township. We got there and as the river was in flood we did not get to see them in operation. We had a couple of local people come and check on us to make sure we knew where they were, they said a lot of people thought the weir was the fish traps. We had a great chat about places on where we should go and have a look along the route we were taking. The weir was in full flood which was great to watch and it was interesting seeing the fish path up the side.





Next stop was finding the confluence of the Barwon and Culgoa river. This is where the Darling River starts. I had found a map that showed where the rivers were and it showed a track right to it. We went to the west side of the rivers and down Twin Rivers Track and then onto West Culgoa Road.

There was some water over the road but it was no issue travelling through it. We found the track out to the confluence so we started following it. We progressed up the track until we came across a very muddy water crossing. We checked it out and it was very squishy mud and as there was only 2 vehicles and I calculated it was only about 1.5km to the river we decided to leave the vehicles and cross the creek and hike to the river. We saw a large mob of goats on our way in.









The silty river was the River Barwon and the browner river is the Culgoa. The Darling River heads off down stream to the right. We hiked back out to the cars and made our way south. We had wondered why we had not been seeing many vehicles on our trip south and when we go to just outside of Bourke we found out why. It appeared the road had been closed at the Bourke end of the road but not the Brewarriner end of the road. It shows how easy it is to find yourself on roads that are closed no matter how

Station via Toorale National Park. On our way there we saw large cotton fields looking all green in the red outback. On the way through Toorale National Park we went to the Toorale Station Homestead. This homestead used to be part of the world's largest sheep station and it is currently in the process of being restored. The homestead is a very grand building and well worth the side trip to visit it.



We arrived at Trilby Station in the late afternoon. We met the owners at their homestead where they gave us a briefing on the station and the things to see in the area. We were given a map to our designated river side campsite. Prior to arriving we had heard that you could order dinner that was cooked onsite and delivered to your campsite. We ordered a 3 course dinner for both nights for our stay so we agreed a time for our entree's to be delivered. It was a 10 min drive from the homestead to our campsite down past the runway and the billabong that had not been full for a number of years. The amazing thing is the billabong is 7km long and it was filled from the Darling River that flooded across their runway a month or two earlier. We settled into our campsite with great views over the Darling River.

The sun went down and our first course for dinner arrived, a beautiful cheese platter with crackers, fruit and a selection of fine cheeses. An hour later our main course arrived, a chicken and potato bake salad, home made rocky road, fudge and a lemon friand desert. For the second night we had lamb shanks, and a tasty dessert. If you ever stay at Trilby order the dinners, they are amazing!!

Day 4 - Trilby Station with a visit to Dunlop Station

We had a lazy get up today as we were not travelling anywhere far. The owner of Trilby suggested we head to Dunlop Station for their 11am morning tea and tour. The Dunlop Homestead and School House used to be part of the worlds largest sheep station. The property is now significantly smaller and was bought by a family about 10 years ago. They are in the process of restoring the property which is a very slow process.





Along with the homestead is the Old Store. This is where workers and travellers could purchase all the things they needed from saddles, to food. It was made with stone from the property and still is in surprisingly good condition for its age. After the store we drove down to the shearing shed. This is the first shearing shed that had mechanical shearers implemented into it.







They are well on their way to restoring it.
This shed processed thousands of bales of wool for the million acre station. Lots of great history at Dunlop Station and well worth the 2 hour tour



Once back at Trilby Station we went to the billabong to have a play in the canoes and a swim. The billabong is 7 km long and was teaming with fish and the birds were having a grand time trying to catch them. We only canoed half of it and it was stunning. The canoes are free to use and enable you to explore another part of the station.






After the billabong we went up to the swimming pool at the homestead for a refreshing dip. Daytime temperatures were around 30 deg so it was very welcome. We chatted to a few other travellers who were staying at the station. This is where we learned about the obelisk in Louth. We did not have a chance to visit on this trip but it is very much on the list for the next one.

Day 5 - Trilby Station to White Cliffs via Tilpa and Wilcannia We had intended on doing the mud map drive of Trilby Station this morning before we left to travel through to White Cliffs but after waking in the middle of the night to the smell of rain we spoke to the owner and

decided to leave early and beat the rain as the roads close. We made it to the famous Tilpa Pub at just after 9am and it was closed. This was also the location we were going to




refuel and came across our first time of not being able to get fuel due to something being closed and not having a





There was limited mobile phone coverage and the pub did not open for another hour. We checked all the weather, roads and it was approximately 1.5 hours from Tilpa to Wilcannia. We had seen the rain in the distance but all the radars showed it moving away from us so we decided to head off to Wilcannia.

We had a challenging drive through this road and can understand why they close the roads when it rains out here. Our 1.5 hours turned into nearly 4 as we were taking it slowly and helped out a caravan and 4wd. The road was closed as we arrived into town along with a whole lot of other people who were heading to the Mundi Mundi Bash. We helped out the caravaners after we got fuel as they had a tyre on their caravan blow out. While Tristan helped with the tyre, I called our next host in White Cliffs to see if we were going to be able to get there and if the roads were closed. The road to White Cliffs is bitumen so that was straight forward. The road to the station we were staying on was not, so had to get that checked. We got the all clear so turned for White Cliffs. This is about an hour from Wilcannia



We met our host at the General Store and she provided us with a map to the camp site at Glen Hope Station. I found this on an app called Hip Camp. We made it to camp and got set up and met some other people that were staying at the station. There was a stunning sunset while we built our fire and cooked dinner.

Day 6 - White Cliffs

Another lazy get up as we were staying in White Cliffs for the day. It was this morning that I learnt of the frogs in the toilets and showers. This is after an early morning visit where I was oblivious of it. Lets just say the next visit I lifted the seat and saw 3 frogs sitting there, one in the grate looking at me and about 3 under the rim. It made for interesting toilet visits from there on in!

We went into town and did the self drive tour around town and had a look at the first commercial solar farm and then heading out to the Opal Fields. We had found out that you could fossick out here for opals without a licence. You can scratch on the surface without a licence but if you dig you need to get a claim. I found a few interesting rocks that we found out had some potch (low grade opal). We went to a few opal shops and chatted to the locals.












Day 7 - White Cliffs to Menindee Lakes via Broken Hill



Day 8 - Relaxing on the lake

the camp site on the lake. Michael went exploring
the other lakes. There was so many fish in the
lake that if you stopped swimming they would
bump into you. Tristan found a net and was
scooping them out. They were carp though so
nothing great. There were also lots of yabbies in
the water. I got my drone out for a play with a
stunning sunset to watch It was a stunning
evening cooking on the fire right on the lake's
edge.





Day 9 - Menindee to Mungo National Park We packed up and headed south towards Mungo National Park. The road was in varying levels of condition from corrugated to bitumen. It was undergoing a lot of development. We got to Pooncarrie for brunch and then went to refuel. We were on a slight angle at the refuel when we noticed that there was a lot of oil pouring out the front of the disco! We moved away from the fuel pump to work out what was going on. Tristan identified that our new aftermarket transmission cooler had a weld fail and lost some oil. We spoke to our mechanic and worked out how to bypass the cooler. We then proceeded on our way to Mungo taking our time. We arrived at Mungo Information centre just before 2 pm. We checked to see if we could make it on the afternoon tour but it was full so we headed to camp to set ourselves up. Once we were set up we headed back to the information centre for a shower. That was an interesting experience coming out of the shower with all the visitors arriving at the centre. We had an early night.











Day 10 - Mungo National Park to Wentworth

Up and at 'em this morning as we had to be at the Information Centre for the Walk the Walls of China Tour at 9am. A local ranger met us and then we drove up to the car park where we commenced our tour. The ranger took us through the Walls of China walk and told us some amazing stories about Mungo Man and Mungo Woman as well as how the aboriginal people lived in the area. It is absolutely stunning and you could feel the history in the area.



After completing the tour we were on the last leg to where the Darling River meets the Murray River. We went to Junction Island in Wentworth and hiked out to where the rivers meet.

Once we completed the hike where I got to see my first ever snake while hiking after being in Australia for 10 years!!

We drove around to Junction Park which gave us a better view of the 2 rivers meeting.

The silty river is the Darling in the front and Murray River at the back. It is incredible seeing the two rivers coming together. This was the end of our 800km trip down the River Darling.







We checked out Lock 10 weir and then we went to Yankabilly Island another stay I found on HipCamp. We met the owners and they directed us to a massive paddock surrounded by a billabong and said we can stay wherever we wanted to. We found a great spot on the edge of the water. We collected some wood and got the fire going and then enjoyed a stunning sunset.







Day 11 -Wentworth Today we farewelled Michael as he headed home and we were going to stay another night in Wentworth with some friends. Michael left early for the journey home and we took it easy packing up and heading off to explore Wentworth.

We went firstly to Perry Sandhills which is a great spot to go sliding down sand dunes. We then went to visit the Wentworth Gaol and explored the days of yesteryear and how they held prisoners. It also spent some of its life as a school. We also went to the local museum and learned about the floods in the early years that most of the town ended up under water. We then went to our friend's house where we relaxed on the Darling River for an evening by the fire.



Day 11 - Wentworth to home

Got up early to head home. We were taking it easy as we were unsure exactly how much oil we had lost from the transmission. We got to just outside of Ouyen and our car went into limp mode. We called RACV and less than 20 mins later we had a tow truck arrive. We spoke to the mechanic and said we just need some transmission fluid and he said I don't want to do that. I will tow it wherever you want and give you a car to get home. We unloaded everything into the car and he arranged to tow it to our mechanics in Foster. We then drove home with no issues. The Disco got to the mechanic the next day and it was ready to go 15mins later after having 6 litres of oil put into the transmission.

Overall the trip was phenomenal. We have a list of places that we want to go back and visit. We saw so many great things, met some great people and had a fantastic break away. If you get the chance I highly recommend doing this trip. It has so many different landscapes and experiences in a relatively short trip - well for Australia any way!!
