On Friday morning I drove up to Mansfield to pick up snow gloves for our son before continuing on to Jamieson to check-in to our accommodation. 



Rig Run Down

Sally & Tristan's Land Rover Discovery 3

We purchased our 3rd Land Rover Discovery in October 2019. It is a 2006 Land Rover Discovery 3. It was very much stock standard when we got it but as is typical for us this was just a blank canvas! So where did we begin? The first thing was an engine remapping to give us a little bit more power for the four wheel driving we were going to be doing. This is the story of setting it up as a stand alone tourer.

STORAGE AND THINGS TO CARRY STUFF

Before we picked it up we installed a snorkel and did a full service. The next stop was to get a roof rack and bull bar onto it so we could carry our tent and get it out on the tracks. We installed the Rhino Rack pioneer platform roof rack and an ARB bull bar. We had to wait for the bull bar so got the rack installed so we could head away for Christmas.



We attached our 270 Foxwing Awning to our roof rack along with maxtrax, gas bottle and general holders so we could easily carry our key items on the roof. Our storage in the back started off as a plywood box that Tristan built as a template for what we wanted and then we used it for over 5 years in the D2. It worked really well for us as a base design so we decided to get a proper draw system made for it.



We did want to upgrade it and I researched all the different drawer systems. We decided to go with the Drifta Draw system. They had a template for the D3 that we worked with as a base. I had seen that they had table built into the system which was awesome. We decided to go with 2 drawers, the table (of course!) a slot for the fridge and then a 35 litre water tank to finish it off. The draw sizes are great and they use a teflon coating for the slides so you are not carrying extra weight for the draw runners.





We have 23 Zero Rear Wheel Carry Bags. These are great for carrying rubbish, dirty recovery gear and things you just don't want inside the cab. I call them our backpacks and they go everywhere with us. You just give them a good hose down when you get home and they are good to go again. We have sand grabba foot mats for the front and rear of the car which are also easy to clean and keep the mud in some semblance of control.

We have a range of bags to pack out stuff into, this helps us stay organised, makes it very quick to pack up as well. We run ARB cargo organizers for our food. They come in 2 sizes and I have 2 small and 1 large so depending on trip I will either take all three or a combination of them. I then split our food up into snacks, brekkies, and then everything else. I am also a bit of a sucker for a Drifta canvas bag so I bought one that holds 10 litres of water (the pura box water) This enables us to carry additional water and then have it easy access at camp as well as the strap just hangs over the rear wheel carrier.





On the back of the drivers seat I have an organiser for all the things you need easy access to, torches, basic hand tools, sun screen, mozzie spray, straps, tyre deflators, mallet. It also means that I am less inclined to forget things as it just gets stored in the cupboard like this as well. I then have bags for everything, a little bag with things to make fire, a bag for washing up, utensils, cooking gear etc. If there is a bag been made for it I will probably have it!! When you are next on a trip with us, just ask and I will be happy to show you :-)



Things to protect us and get us out of places we got stuck

There are only a couple of brands of bull bar that fit the Discovery and we had had great experiences with ARB previously so we chose them. When the bull bar was installed we added a Warn winch to the bar with



dyneema rope and wireless controller. This is something that we will never compromise on, a good quality winch and ropes, they will get you out of some pretty interesting spots and you need to be able to trust the gear will work when you need it to. We also have 4 maxtrax for those quick recoveries in sand or snow. We replaced the side steps with ADT rock sliders after bending the steps on a pretty simple bog hole. The rock sliders are a bit stronger and we can still use them as steps for access to the roof or in the car.

We installed front and rear ARB Air Lockers in 2021 and while the Disco is incredibly capable off road without them, the lockers take it to the next level. Disco's do not do well with cross axel situations which occur on a semi-regular basis in the high country with the whoopty-doos. Having the lockers now means we can crawl up and down and through pretty much anything that we point the vehicle at.



Electrical

We don't have a huge electrical requirement when we are away, our fridge(s) and some LED lights, charging for our phones, radios etc. We have set up a Red Arc dual battery system with a 100am lithium ion Hard Korr Battery. To charge it we also have a 180W Hard Korr Foldable Solar Panel which can pump out 7amps in full sunlight which is incredible. We have run the battery in a battery box so it is full portable if we need to pull it out of the vehicle. I bet you were thinking we had all sorts of crazy stuff considering we are Electricians! But we like to keep it pretty simple.

Keeping It Cool

With our vehicle set up as a stand alone tourer with no trailer we have our main fridge which is a relatively small Waeco CFX45. This is a single zone fridge that sits on a Waeco Fridge Slide. We have had it for over 8 years and it is still going strong. We did find though for longer trips it was not quite enough so we bought a small Engel Fridge/ Freezer 17 litres. This we use as our freezer or if it is an overnighter we can just take this fridge. This means we are easily able to carry enough food for well over 10 days off grid which is great. It also means we can take ice cream camping in the middle of summer for a little touch of luxury.



Light It Up

For our lights we have got the standard headlights for the car and we were lucky enough to get a sample of the Hella Rok Lume Spot Lights. They are small but powerful, they are some of the best off road spot lights I have ever seen and love them. They are easy on the eye, no glare and light up the area in front of you just like a beautiful soft daylight. They are small and don't take up a lot of space either. I highly recommend them. Not the cheapest on the market by far but definitely up there in quality. We also have some portable LED strip light that we use around camp if required. Not that we actually use them a lot.

Wheels and Tyres

The Disco comes with 18" wheels which make tyre choices difficult as there is not a huge range in that size. We decided to go with Coopers and we had nothing but issues with them. 3 punctures in a very short space of time. I am glad we had decided to carry 2 spares otherwise things could have been a whole lot more interesting. Carrying 2 spares is a choice we made due to the fact we were setting this vehicle up for touring and with different tyre sizes we wanted



to make sure we could get ourselves to where we needed to go. We went with the Outback Accessories rear bar with twin wheel carrier, we can always change one out for a jerry can holder if we choose as well. Opposite Lock fitted this bar for us. After all our tyre issues we decided to change our wheels out to 17" ones which we can do as some Disco's had those wheels as standard. We then put Maxxis razzr AT811 tyres on them and have had only good things to say about them. They bag out well, great grip and no punctures so far!



It is easy to remove the air but how do we pump up the tyres again? We started with an ARB portable single compressor but after watching Stu and Maree pump up all their tyres with onboard air and then watch us doing ours we decided to move to an onboard air system. We upgraded to an ARB twin compressor. installed it under our drawer system, put in an air tank where the spare wheel used to go with a nozzle and air hose. We can now pump up 4 tyres in less time than 1 or 2 took us

previously, and I also save space in the drawers etc. This one is a relatively simple mod that pays back in time.

But what about things we need for towing?

We have recently bought a new camper trailer so we had to make a couple of modifications for this addition to our touring set up. Because we run an automatic we decided to add an aftermarket Transmission cooler onto the vehicle so that the additional pressures on the transmission with towing were able to be mitigated with additional cooling.

A Mitch Hitch was added to the rear to realign the hitch location because on the D3's they are in quite a low position which is not great for towing camper trailers. This has given us a solid and easy access hitch for both hooking the camper up to along with our recovery hitch should we ever need to pull someone out of a predicament. A RedArc Electric brake controller was added to ensure we are able to control the braking of our new trailer and keep it following us as they should!

To see behind when towing is also very useful and saves on some discussions when trying to hitch up the camper. We installed the Safety Dave camera system to both the back of the Disco and also the trailer. As our car is nearly 20 years old we updated the head unit so we can see the cameras, also get google maps, bluetooth phone calling etc. Now it looks a bit fancy in the cabin as well.



One final thing we have done is get her a custom number plate of OFFTRX.(hidden by Ed!!) This shows what we have built her for. Get off the bitumen and onto the tracks all over the country and explore as many as we can.



Future Modifications?

We think we are pretty close to done on the modifications, but I will never say never and I am sure there is something that we will update, change or modify. We won't be doing a long range tank due to weight.

Overall this has taken us many trips over the years, lots of refining and nearly 3 years of work to get her set up how we want. We can now have her packed up in less than 30 mins ready to go on any trip we desire for as long as we want.
