<u>Four Wheel Drive Victoria</u> have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:




### Friday

Wonnangatta has always been on our list to do so Melbourne Cup weekend this year was the year. We met at BP Packenham Bypass at 8am for an 830am departure. The intention was get to camp early in the afternoon to allow time to go and find a waterfall that I had found on the map.

We got our coffees and morning snacks and hit the road. Our first stop was to the bakery in Heyfield to make sure we had our bread for the weekend. They had one of the best vanilla squares that I have had in a while (and yes I have a few of them!)

They were having some fuel system issues. There was no mobile coverage so we had a chat about the options they asked if we could tow them up to the lookout which was about 5km away. 










We decided that Conglomerate Falls was too far today so put it on the list for another time. We headed back to camp to settle in around the fire. It was such a stunning site.







After we left the hut we headed for Zeka Spur. At the top of the track it had had a lot of work done on it. Looks like they did a lot drainage work so the track is very smooth. They decided they wanted to join us so jumped into the middle of the convoy. The track was graded and very smooth. There were a few trees down across the track that we could drive under. We came across one tree though that had be trimmed very close to the edge and we decided it was safer to trim it up a bit more so we could more easily get through so Tristan cut that tree back a bit more.




We continued down Zeka Spur with no issues at all. It took an hour or two to get down and then we headed into the valley getting the iconic photo of crossing the river as we went down the valley.




We headed into the main part of the valley where the old homestead was and all the campsites along the river were already taken. More vehicles must have gone in on Friday than we anticipated. So we decided to head along the bottom track along the river to see what we could find. We came round a corner and there was an Alpine Dingo standing in the middle of the track. We knew about them but it was awesome to see them in the wild.



We carried along the track and came across some muddy bogs, it was apparent that this track would be difficult in the wet. There was lots of ruts and dig outs. We had some fun going through the bog.



We then came across a section of the track towards the end of the valley that were very deep and would be tricky to negotiate. We had seen a clearing just before it so while Tristan was going ahead to check if we could find something after the ruts Neville was checking out the clearing as a potential spot for Lunch..



We decided we would have lunch at the clearing and decide what we were going to do. Neville instead found another clearing closer to the river that he reckoned would be perfect for our camp. So we headed in to have a look and it was so we cleared a couple of trees and drove in. We then set up camp and relaxed. 
### Sunday


Our plan for Sunday was to have a sleep in and a lazy day checking out the valley and kicking around camp. We headed off back along the bottom track towards to homestead area. We ran into the Ranger and a Police Vehicle. We showed them the picture of the swamp and he was like no way I just had a bulldozer clear it out 2 days ago.

We carried on to the homestead and there were a few people around but it was not crazy busy.














We had been told a fun track to look at is Dry River Track. We had the maps and headed up the valley to the start of the track and then turned in. It looked fun and we had a few bog holes. We then came up to a section that was just bog so Tristan went in to have a look, it was too gnarly and deep so went to back out. As he backed out he caught the edge of the rear drivers side flare and ripped it off. The flares on the Disco are attached to the mud flaps so we needed to do some track side repairs. Lets just say that flare is not going anywhere anytime soon!

We decided that this track was not going to be done so turned around. The plan was to then head along the top track up the valley to check out the impassable swamp and then turn around and go back to camp. It was surprising how high up the top track is considering how close it is to the bottom track. We did not meet many vehicles. We got to the intersection of the two tracks so turned down the hill towards the swamp.

As we were heading towards the swamp Jacqui got caught up in a section and needed to be winched. Daisy and us were not far from the swamp so we went ahead to check it out. When we got there we could see that it had been driven through. Someone had spent a lot of time cutting the tree and winching it out of the way. We were still not convinced that it was going to be passable as one end of it was over 800mm deep and very sloppy. The other end looked like it could be ok but required us to go in then turn hard left and then hard right out of the bog. While we were having a look a couple of vehicles came from the other side and we said you could potentially go left (for them) and they said yip, we have been told to go left so we watched them do it and it was not that deep and definitely passable. So we radioed everyone and said yes we can get through. This then meant we had a short 200m section with some very deep ruts to negotiate back to camp that with some picking of lines we would get through.



Everyone had caught up at this stage so we started the process of getting everyone through the swamp. It went without a hitch and we were all through in a short space of time.

Next came the ruts. They were a bit challenging but passable with choosing your lines. We got through ok. Next up was Daisy who was worried about the ruts as she does not have as much clearance as we do. She did really well but at the end hugged a tree too close and bent her side step. Tristan helped her get through the last section to just by our camp. I spotted everyone else through the last section and then we headed back to camp.

The afternoon was a lazy one in front of the fire and swimming. Lynton and Steve went fishing and Daisy cooked up a cob loaf for us on the fire and the camp oven with Michael helping out cooking up the bacon and spring onions.



We all gobbled it up and relaxed for the evening.

### Monday

Our original plan was to head out to Cynthia Range and down through to Crooked River but I had spoken to a Ranger before we left and there had been issues with debris in Crooked River that may have caused issues so we decided that we were going to head out towards Myrtleford and head through to Lake Cobbler for the night. So we packed up and headed back up the valley. When we got back to the homestead area we ran into a light truck about to head down the river track. We pulled over to have a chat to them and they were actually trying to head the same way as we were as we advised them that the track they were heading down they would have issues with the swamp. They turned around and left while the rest of our group caught up.






Everyone was leaving the area at the same time. A group headed out ahead of us but went up Zeka Spur and then the truck and then us. There was a group on the same channel worried about the group ahead of them so I jumped on the radio and let them know we were going in a different direction so that it was not as bad as they thought it was.

We headed out towards Abeyard. It was a great climb up and down. As we were coming down an incredibly steep hill we saw a baby echidna on the road. We stopped and hopped out to have a look and it waddled across the track and put its head under a couple of leaves so it was well hidden!



We also came across some hikers who were making there way down the track. They weren't too chatty with us so we let them know how many vehicles were coming down and we carried on our way to the bottom. Michael radioed through to say he had spoken to the hikers and one was injured so he was taking one of them to their car so they could go back and pick them up. We waited down the bottom and had a snack. We then found out that the hikers were in the late 70's and early 80's/. I hope to be still out enjoying the bush at those ages.





We turned off to Lake Cobbler Track which in the dry is great but a little touch of rain and it will turn incredibly crazy very quickly. We came across a lady with a car and camper trailer who said there was a group ahead with a big tree down so we carried on to find out more. It was huge. They had been working for a couple of hours already when we got there. Neville grabbed his chainsaw when we asked him for it as they needed more chainsaws. Tristan and Neville helped out. They used a winch with 2 vehicles tied together and then the winch failed. They switched up vehicles and still could not pull it down on the track. They kept cutting and trimming and then it was about to be called that we could not get through and the driver of the front vehicle now with a broken winch too just pulled the tree like it was on a snatch rope and gave it a couple of big pulls and then to came down onto the track.

Tristan was like lets just push it off and before we knew it there were about 10 guys all lined up and giving the log a huge push over the edge and a big cheer as it took off down the hill.









We carried on down Lake Cobbler Track which had some very very steep sections with a section that was very shaley and was right on the edge of a very big drop off. Once we got down we headed to the lookout to Dangdongadale Falls. The tallest drop of falls in Victoria.

We then made our way into Lake Cobbler. We were hoping that there would be space for us to camp. Most of the sites were taken up with hikers but there was enough space for us to set up next to the Lake Cobbler Hut.

We got all set up and then Jacqui came over and said she wanted to go on a hike as she still had a lot of energy. There was a sign that said Mt Cobbler 4km, 2 Hours. 















## TUESDAY


# **Trip Report**
