

Meet the Member



<u>Four Wheel Drive Victoria</u> have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:

St Annes Winery Xmas in July - 07th – 09th of July - Daisy






Dessert was a bit stuffed up due to Daisy's cheap Kmart can openers.






Trip Report


For those who had done previous trips, we experienced a lot less snow than usual but still a great weekend for all and for me and a few other first timers looking forward to next year.

Day 1:

I managed to get an early start on the Friday morning so got in to camp around 11:30am to secure a spot. There was no one else there so I set up on the flattest part of the campground and put up a decoy gazebo to give us plenty of room. Then I made myself some lunch and set to the task of relaxing while waiting for the rest of the group to arrive.


John led us to the old hut site where we got out and explored for a bit. It was still fairly early so we decided to head back down to the lookout picnic site to have lunch.

We aired up the tyres, Riley carried out some maintenance on the Patrol and then spent the rest of the evening preparing our meals and socialising around the campfire.




Trip Report








The weather was quite mild & the tracks were quite dry for the most part with traction never a problem during the whole trip.

Leaving the hut, we headed south following the Mt Terrible track, Ryan Spur track eventually reaching Moonlight Spur track for the descent into Knockwood where we stopped for Lunch. The last creek crossing at the bottom of Moonlight Spur was deceptively deep with the water coming almost over the Bonnet.





We then set off down the main Mansfield -Woods Point Road, heading back towards Jamieson passing the many popular campsites along the Goulburn River, back to the start of Poletti track. Being dry, Poletti track posed no problems and we climbed back up to Mt Terrible track before turning right and then a short distance later swung left onto Fryers Creek Road. While not a difficult track, it appears to get little traffic and was quite narrow with the bush closed in.

It was lucky that the track was slow going as I nearly had a head-on with a trail bike rider who clearly was not expecting anyone else to be on the track and he had to take emergency action to avoid head butting my Bullbar. Neville was behind me and spoke briefly to the rider, who Neville thought appeared somewhat shaken up.

Now back to the main Eildon – Jamieson Road, and it was only a short distance back the camp arriving at 4:00 pm. All up, a great day's driving covering a distance of 95km.



Dinner for Saturday was Curried Snags which had been organized by Matt. Neville brought the snags but Matt had the Curry ingredients. Luckily, Neville had the foresight to bring a couple of packets of curry powder mix so all was not lost. My part of the deal was to make some camp bread. It didn't rise as much as I think it should have, so will try 2 packets of yeast next time, but with some Butter & Raspberry jam it was still delicious.







After going to bed a bit earlier this time, we set off after a breakfast of bacon and eggs, taking the Big River Road. Turning off at Enochs point, we found a Historic Cemetery which had an interesting story. Apparently, miners had started digging under the graves looking for Gold, so 5 acres were set aside and in 1896 was became an official Cemetery. Dotted all around the graves are remnants of those mines with some shafts fenced off due to the danger. The last grave was filled in 1908.





Moving on, the Big River "road" turned into a rocky 4wd track for quite some distance with a couple of shallow creek crossings as well.

We arrived at Stockman's Reward campground for a short lunch stop for before heading up Morris Road which takes you up to the Woods Point-Marysville Road. Normally, this road is not difficult but has been chopped up in a few places and has a steep section now with very deep ruts. Being dry, we were able to straddle the ruts without risk of sliding in, as we would have bottomed out for sure.

Arriving at the Woods point road we turned right to head back past Cumberland Junction to go to onto Cambarville the home of the Big tree. Cambarville was once a logging community which closed after the mill was destroyed by fire in 1971. A short walk takes you to the Elephant tree and then the "Big tree".



It was once believed to be Australia's tallest tree; the top of the tree was broken off in a storm in 1959 and now has a height of just under 88 metres.



The trip back to Warburton via the Reefton Spur had claimed some more victims. Police were in attendance as two cars were towed away. It appeared that one of the cars had cut the corner. It always pays to be careful on this stretch of road as it is well used by motorcyclists and driving enthusiasts and accidents are common, especially among motorcycle riders.

A fantastic weekend was had with no rain, terrific weather, tracks in good condition for this time of the year, and some great four-wheel driving. You couldn't ask for more.
