



# **Track Classifications**

<u>Four Wheel Drive Victoria</u> have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:


David headed up before the rest of the pack, leaving home on the Wednesday afternoon in order to secure a spot for us all along Long Beach, Ulupna Island.

We spotted a koala along the way and pulled in at camp around 3pm or so.




David, Dean, Joy and Michael were already set up, relaxing (which was everyone's main aim for the weekend) when we arrived.


After a couple of late withdrawals, the trip was now down to just two cars. We planned on leaving on the 9th Jan but after the heavy rain and flooding that occurred around the State the day before, Steve and I discussed whether to cancel. As the worst of the rain had fallen further West from our destination, we decided to continue.

Leaving our meeting point at Officer at 8:15, the day started off cool and overcast. Our first destination was Swifts creek which was also the last refueling point. Arriving at 12:30 it was a good spot to stop for lunch as well. By this time the clouds had cleared to a nice sunny day which turned out to be a harbinger of things to come. The Trip plan was to head north from Bairnsdale to Swifts Creek, then onto Bentley Plain Campground for the first night, second night at Native Dog Creek and third night at McKillops bridge..





After re-fueling the cars and ourselves, we drove the 5 km to the Bindi Road turn off which would take us to the first point of interest, the Washington Winch. This is a steam powered winch made in Seattle, USA and shipped to Australia in the 1920's.

Not far from the Winch is Mt Nugong fire tower which unfortunately does not much of a view at ground level. South Escarpment track took us to the top for a quick look around, then we continued on. This little used track was very interesting as it turned out to be very wet and extremely slippery. One steep downhill section proved to be very tricky, and we were sliding sideways at times as there was just no traction. We would be winching back up if we could not get through, but we made it through to Bentley Plain road and turned left for the for the short drive to Bentley Plain Camping area, arriving at 3:00 pm.

The worry of mosquitoes turned out to be unfounded as surprisingly there weren't any to speak of. There were a few leeches around though and both Steve and I made blood donations.

#### Day 2

This morning, we headed North along Escarpment track with a turn off to the top of Mt Bindi at 1494 metres. There is a small grassy area at the top, again the trees blocking most of the view. Back again along Escarpment track which provided some downed trees, muddy rutted sections and one big bog hole for our entertainment. Two large gum trees had come and would have taken too much effort to clear but fortunately there was just enough space to drive through the bush to get around them.

Turning onto Nunniong Plains track we headed to the picturesque Nunniong Plains. After the rain, the tracks across the plains were saturated and boggy but a firm base made the drive across without problem. A herd of Brumbies were spotted in the distance but ran off as soon as they saw us.



From Nunniong Plains we skirted the Alpine National park taking Jam Tin Flat Track and Nunniong Road stopping at the junction of the sadly named Forlorn Hope Track for lunch, at an altitude of 1540 metres.



Our destination for the night was Native Dog Flat Campground. A diversion was made along Limestone creek track to check out the Limestone Creek camping area and then continued up to the first creek crossing where we turned back. A surprise encounter way out here was a fully marked Colorado Police Divy van.




#### Day 3

After a lovely night around the Campfire, Steve was up early and spotted a mob of Brumbies up closejust near the camp.

A late start at 10am, we departed for Suggan Buggan following Limestone Creek Road to the Snowy River Road.

The Snowy River Road is quite narrow & descends almost 500 metres into Suggan Buggan offering fantastic views, made all the better with the clear blue skies.

From here we continued further north to Willis on the NSW Border and to check out the Snowy River.

Heading back after having had lunch by the Snowy, Steve said, "Let's have a look at Sandy Creek Track as it loops back to the main road and Hema rates it Medium".

Well, this Medium track was heavily washed out with deep ruts and a few go-around tracks, was a bit more than medium in my opinion. About half way in we passed a Double Black diamond sign. It didn't seem too bad at this stage, so we kept going. Coming to a steep climb, we started off ok, but at about a third of the way up the track became very steep with some ominous looking rocks, holes and ruts. Wee walked up to have a look and decided that we did not have the ground clearance necessary. Making a 20 point turn we avoided having to reverse back down. By this time it was 2:00 pm so with the remote location and the time of day retreat was definitely the sensible option.

After making it back to the main road, we headed off to our last campsite at McKillops Bridge, not arriving until 5:30pm after making a diversion to Gilantipy for fuel. The camping area at McKillops Bridge is on the side of the hill with not many flat areas to pitch a tent and quite dry and devoid of grass. It would be very muddy when wet.

Last night around the Campfire and we had some visitors looking for a free meal. The local Brush Tail possums were quite tame and could be hand fed.



#### Day 4

Leaving for home the next morning with a planned stop at the Little River Gorge, which is Victoria's deepest at 500 metres and about 4km long.


It is a 400 metre walk from the carpark to the viewing platform to see one of Victoria's lesser known natural wonders. Again the pictures just do justice to the landscape.
