

### Thank you for choosing the Victorian Four Wheel Drive Club

If you are interested in joining <u>Club Noble</u> where we hold our monthly meetings, their application form can be found <u>here</u>.

<u>Four Wheel Drive Victoria</u> have a track grading classification scale which has been developed to assist in advising Trip Leaders and participants on 4WD trips of the type of tracks that they can expect to encounter. On most trips participants can expect that a variety of tracks will be traversed each with an appropriate rating. Trip Leaders should advise participants of the range of track ratings expected to be encountered on the planned route. The following classifications will assist in determining an overall Trip Rating:

#### **Training Session: Equipping Us for Adventure**

As we arrived at Sally and Tristan's workplace, we were warmly greeted with steaming cups of coffee and a delicious morning breakfast. This set the tone for a fantastic training session, packed with valuable insights and practical tips.

Sally's comprehensive PowerPoint presentation covered everything from planning to execution, demystifying the art of organizing a successful off-roading trip. Sally has created a Trip Leader Checklist which I would highjly recommend that all members read and use this check list. To view the check list please use link below.

After the training session, we relaxed over a satisfying lunch, reflecting on our newfound knowledge and feeling more confident than ever. For those who couldn't join us, we've included some high-level notes below, capturing the essence of our discussion.

#### 1. Pre-Trip Preparation:

- Research tracks and explore 4WD Victoria sites or other relevant sources.
- Consider doing a reconnaissance trip to assess track condition
- Check YouTube for videos of different tracks on your trip.
- Verify if any local events might affect track availability or cause closures during your trip.
- Ensure you have any necessary permits or permissions for access.



### 2. Fuel and Vehicle Considerations:

- Factor in fuel stops when planning your route. Check fuel station hours, especially in country towns.
- Plan based on your vehicle's fuel consumption (both diesel and unleaded 91).
- Monitor fuel levels for each person throughout the trip.
- Consider driving speed, as it affects fuel consumption.
- Always have enough fuel to reach the next town in case you can't access a fuel station.

### 3. Route Planning and Safety Measures:

- Plan alternative routes in case of track issues (e.g., poor conditions).
- Use the Garmin Overlander for real-time location and paper maps for backup.
- Coordinate with your navigator to make trip planning easier.
- Give way to vehicles going uphill on tracks.
- Understand track gradings; easy starts may lead to challenging sections.
- Run trips within your comfort level and be prepared to assist others.
- Recommended minimum group size is three cars for mutual support (max 8 people, 5 cars for first-timers).
- Assess driver and 4WD capability; set requirements for trip participation.
- Always carry recovery equipment and ensure all members have the right gear.
- Be aware of weather conditions; rain, snow, or extreme heat can affect track conditions and vehicle performance.
- Tracks may become more challenging during wet or icy conditions.
- Seasonal changes affect vegetation growth and wildlife activity.
- Ensure that all vehicles are 4WD-ready. Regular maintenance, proper tires, and necessary equipment are crucial.
- If a new member expresses interest in a challenging course, be honest. Advise them if it's not suitable for their experience level.
- As the trip leader, you have the final say. Consider safety factors like terrain, weather, and participant experience.
- Remember, the club backs your decisions. Safety first!
- Have a briefing at the meeting point go through the plan for trip, radio channels used and time frames so everyone is informed. Make sure everyone is comfortable and understand.
- Make sure you have a VFWDC personal form in all cars for each member
- Don't be afraid to do a U turn if safe if a track or road is unsafe.
- Assign one person to oversee recovery operations. This ensures that the process is executed safely and efficiently.
- Take a moment to analyze the situation before attempting recovery. Safety should always be the top priority.
- Recovery can be intense, especially in off-road conditions. Encourage everyone to slow down and focus on safety.
- Instead of multiple opinions, have one designated person handle the recovery process.
- Try make note when you do and don't get phone signal if need to make phone calls.

### 4. Rescue Devices:

- Carry a GPS PLB (Personal Locator Beacon) for emergency situations.
- Zoleo is a reliable product for sending SMS messages and SOS signals when traveling remotely.
- Use the Emergency Plus app on your mobile phone to access critical services information and provide your exact location.
- Share a three-word location for easier communication with emergency services.
- Ensure the trip leader carries a first aid kit.



#### 5. Risk Assessment and Planning:

- Consider your destination and weather conditions.
- Designate a "ground charlie" who stays behind and can notify emergency services if needed.
- Have an emergency plan in place, including predetermined decision points (e.g., turning back due to extreme temperatures or heavy rain).

#### 6. Two-Way Radio Channels:

- Maintain a printed list of radio channels in your car.
- Use specific channels for different situations (e.g., emergency services on channel 5 or 6, highway channel on channel 40, club/national parks on channel 10).

#### 7. Sources of Information:

- Consult local members during meetings for their knowledge.
- Utilize mobile apps like AllTrails, Avenza Maps, Google Maps, Newtracs, Hema, Vic More to Explore, Wikicamps, Hipcamp, where is public toilet, bom, Vic traffic and parks victoria. Note most map apps allow offline download so you can access without signal.
- Always carry paper maps as a backup.
- When planning your 4WD trip, it's essential to consider river crossings and their safety. Checking river heights is crucial. For instance, the Wonnangatta River at Crooked River can become too deep for cars when it goes above 1.6 meters, and at 1.8 meters, cars may even float. You can find real-time river height information on the Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) (http://www.bom.gov.au/vic/flood/rain\_river.shtml).

#### 8. The Convoy:

- Arrange the convoy so that experienced drivers are interspersed with less experienced ones.
- Ensure visibility of the vehicle behind you.
- Mark corners over the radio to make it clear for everyone.
- The last person in the convoy should advise when they pass a corner, helping estimate convoy timing.
- Always communicate when incoming cars are approaching.
- Remember that you're all in this together.
- Support each other throughout the journey.

### Details

This excursion was a shakedown trip for Sally & Tristan's new Y62 Patrol. A sizable group signed up for the adventure, initially limited to 10 4WDs, but thanks to Sally & Tristan's generosity, everyone was included!!

Before the trip began, a lively Facebook chat group was formed to coordinate and organize the expedition, offering a tantalizing glimpse of the excitement to come.

### Day 1 - Thursday, April 25

Our journey kicked off from the 7/11 on Western Ring Road in Derrimut at 8 AM. 


#### Second Stopover: St Arnaud Silo Art

### Off the Bitumen

As we passed through the town of Murrayville, I eagerly anticipated our departure from the paved road. My wait was short-lived, as I soon spotted Tristan and Sally waiting at the turnoff to "No.6 Bore Rd South". Once we turned onto No.6 road, the buildup began - the road rapidly deteriorated into a dusty dirt track. #### Prepping for the Challenge

As we aired down our tires, the excitement levels were building! We gathered around Tristan and Sally, who shared valuable sand driving tips and expertise: the importance of proper tire pressures, when to use 4Hi vs 4Lo, whether to engage traction control or not, and the role of momentum. This impromptu tutorial instilled a sense of confidence in me, as I had never driven on sand before. I felt more prepared to tackle the challenge ahead!



#### The Sandy Incline Challenge

With our tires aired down and our hearts racing, we watched as Tristan and Sally took on the sandy incline challenge first. Towing a trailer weighing over a ton, their V8 Patrol labored under the load. Despite their best efforts, they bogged down on their first attempt and had to reverse and try again. The second attempt also ended in a bogging, but they didn't give up. After letting more air out of their tires, they made a third attempt - and this time, they successfully crossed the incline, albeit with a shaky trailer that looked like it was in a washing machine due to the deep ruts at the top!

With Tristan and Sally through, they shared their experiences and tips with the group, and we all followed suit, crossing the incline without any issues (perhaps due to the lack of trailers and the wisdom gained from watching Tristan and Sally's attempts)!

#### Arrival at Blue Gums Campsite

After conquering the sandy incline, we descended into the picturesque Blue Gums campsite, our home for the night. 

#### Into the Big Desert

With a quick radio check, we hit the "Fire Break Tk" and headed towards the "Cactus Bore Tk" intersection, where we turned off to venture deeper into the Big Desert. Glen and Steve C kept watch as our trusty tail-end charlie, ensuring everyone made the turn onto the track.

The "Cactus Bore Tk" presented mild challenges at almost every turn, allowing us to practice different 4WD techniques and get comfortable navigating sand dunes. I experimented with various throttle inputs while climbing inclines, learning that too much momentum on a rutted incline could result in a shaky experience!

As we navigated the track, radio chatter alerted us to an oncoming truck. It was surprising to think a truck could find its way onto our remote track, but we quickly moved aside to let it pass.

Further on, another interesting radio transmission caught our attention: a bee site ahead! We halted to observe from a distance, snapping photos of the white boxes staked with bee hives. After a brief pause, we continued on to finally reach "Cactus Bore".

#### **Playtime at Cactus Bore**

For the next 1.5 hours, we played and honed our 4WD skills at "Cactus Bore", a technical dune that required precision driving. The challenge wasn't steep, but it demanded a hard left, followed by a quick hard right, and then maintaining momentum through a steep, narrow section. It was a workout for our driving skills, requiring control and momentum to navigate the tight turns and incline.

Tristan and Sally led the way in their V8 Patrol, effortlessly conquering the challenge. Next up was Michael in his Ranger, with Tristan and Sally providing guidance. Michael made it look easy, navigating the turns with finesse and crossing in one go.

Ken took his turn, but unfortunately, got bogged. After a few attempts and some advice from Tristan and the group, Ken realized the importance of proper tire pressure on sand and lowered his pressures further. This was a humbling reminder for me that appearances can be deceiving, and the challenge was more difficult than it seemed. Additionally, it highlighted the crucial role of tire pressure in sand driving.



### **Taking on Cactus Bore**

While Ken was adjusting his tire pressure, Lynton took his turn and successfully navigated the challenge on his first attempt without any issues.

Next, it was my turn. I made an attempt but got bogged on the narrow incline of the dune. My second attempt ended in a similar fashion, and I realized I needed to lower my tire pressure further. As the driver of a Hilux ute, I was facing a similar issue to Ken's Triton.

After my attempts, Ken gave it another go, and with his pressure adjusted, he made it look easy, crossing the dune without any difficulties.

### **Cactus Bore Challenges**


Next up were Steve and Amanda, who bogged on their first attempt but succeeded on their second try. Jacqui and Dan in their 80 series Land Cruiser took a few attempts but couldn't quite make it across, so they lowered their tire pressure further.

I made my third attempt, but unfortunately bogged again. Tristan offered some advice, suggesting I switch to S2 Lo instead of S3 Lo. With the correct gearing and tire pressure, I finally made it across on my fourth attempt!

Adam in his manual GU Patrol took a couple of attempts to conquer the challenge, while Jacqui and Dan returned with adjusted tire pressure and sailed across easily. Steve C in his Pajero had an exciting first attempt, with his wheel hitting the bank and giving the vehicle some airtime! He laughed it off and tried again, successfully completing the challenge.

Last but not least, Glen in his Ford Maverick took a couple of attempts to cross, navigating the challenge without a turbo.

The Cactus Bore challenge was a great reminder that even seemingly easy tracks can be deceiving, and it's important to stay focused and adjust your approach as needed.

Steve C, Michael, and Adam followed, all successfully cresting the dune without a hitch. Ken returned, pressures lowered, and cruised across with ease.

Now it was my turn. I psyched myself up, remembering Tristan's advice: "Don't lift your foot off the pedal!" I geared up in S3 Lo, activated 'power mode' for maximum performance, revved the Hilux, and launched up the dune! Sally guided me to the middle track, and for a moment, I hesitated, but trusting my vehicle and the advice, I kept my foot down, maintaining momentum. The rush was exhilarating as I crested the top and descended back to the base, feeling triumphant!

Steve and Amanda took their turns, with Steve's V8 Patrol effortlessly reaching the top. Amanda followed, impressively navigating the steep dune with ease. Next up was Jacqui in her manual 80 series, who stalled near the top but skillfully recovered with a stall start and reverse maneuver. Glen faced a tougher challenge without a turbo, but persevered and finally made it across with a impressive manual downshift!

With everyone successfully creating the dune, the excitement only grew. Some of us tackled the remaining tracks, with Tristan leading the charge on the steepest right track (#2) and even circling back to conquer track #3! Emboldened, I followed suit, driving up tracks 2 and 3, along with Lynton, Steve C, and Dan. Tristan's guidance and encouragement helped us push our limits.

As we returned to camp, elation filled the air. We celebrated our triumphs with drinks, dinner, and lively conversations around the bonfire, already planning our next adventure. The day's challenges had forged unbreakable bonds, and we retired to our beds, already eager for the next day's thrills.

# President

The President's role is a voted committee position and it is the President's responsibility to be fully versed with the Club Rules.

- Lead General Meetings making sure they are held in accordance with the requirements as specified in the Constitution.
- Prepare Agenda and lead the meeting, keeping discussion relevant, decision making clear and encouraging member participation when required.
- Appoint General Committee roles and Delegate duties to the Committee Members.

- Write monthly President's Report for the newsletter to report relevant information to members.
- Attend relevant Four Wheel Drive Victoria meetings when required.

- Before the election of new committee members at an annual general meeting, the President must present to the meeting the annual report of the Committee on the activities of the club during the last financial year.

# Vice President

The Vice President's role is a voted committee position and it is the Vice President's responsibility to be fully versed with the Club Rules.

- To provide support and backup to the President in their relevant duties
- To convene and run orderly meetings in accordance to the Clubs Constitution in the event the President is absent.
- To organise guest speakers or external club visits for selected meetings and be responsible coordinating the attendance of the guest.

# Secretary

The Secretary's role is a voted committee position and it is the Secretary's responsibility to be fully versed with the Club Rules.

- Collect the club mail from the club PO Box (778) at Dandenong Plaza Shopping Centre prior to the General Meeting
- Attend the General Meeting ensuring that the Attendance, Apologies and Visitors books are available for members / visitors to sign in
- Take the minutes of the General Meeting
- Present the incoming and outgoing correspondence at the General Meeting
- Type up the minutes noting number of attendees, apologies and visitors
- Attend the committee meeting
- File correspondence in and minutes of the general meeting
- Attend to any outgoing correspondence as determined by the committee
- Coordinate with treasurer to ensure a register of members is maintained in accordance with the rules.
- Liaise with Consumer Affairs Victoria to meet club obligations

## Treasurer

The Treasurer's role is a voted committee position and it is the Treasurer's responsibility to be fully versed with the Club Rules.

- To receive all new member application, and member renewal forms and monies and issue receipts
- Deposit all monies received into the club bank account (from membership fees, club raffles, sales of merchandise etc.
- Keep a record of the accounts—which can be made available by request of any club member
- Prepare a monthly financial status report for the General Meetings
- Prepare the AGM report with full annual financials, which will also include president and trip coordinators reports
- Update 4WD Victoria for membership lists to ensure insurance compliance
- Maintain the membership list
- Print and distribute membership cards for current year.

# **Trip Coordinator**

The Trip Coordinator's role is a voted committee position and it is the Trip Coordinator's responsibility to be fully versed with the Club Rules.

- Ensure attendance to each Club General Meeting fully prepared to present with relevant information of past and upcoming trips.
- If unable to attend it is the Trip Coordinator's duty to ensure another committee member has the up to date trip information for the Club Meeting
- Ensure all trip information is correctly recorded and stored
- Ensure the Trip Information Forms are up to date for each meeting
- Ensure copies of other relevant forms are available if or when needed (Track survey reports, Accident Survey Form, Trip Incident form, Personal Information forms, Trip rating information)
- Ensure all TDF (Trip Data Forms) are filled in correctly and a copy is passed onto the Newsletter Editor
- Liaise with the Newsletter Editor and follow up any trip reports that haven't been submitted.

# **Association Representative**

The Association Representative's role is a voted committee position and it is the Association Representative's responsibility to be fully versed with the Club Rules.

- To attend all Association meetings, and to report back to committee and also the General meetings with all items pertaining to the Victorian Four Wheel Drive Association.
- External liaison with other affiliated groups.

#### **General Committee Member**

- Attend and contribute to Committee Meetings
- Assist committee in running of club.
- Club Editor will be in charge of creating the monthly magazine.
